THIS Day the House of Commons of this Kingdom attended his Grace the Lord Lieutenant at the Castle with their Address of Thanks to his Majesty; which Address is as follows. *T,*

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to return your Majesty our humble Thanks for your Majesty's most gracious Answer to the Address of this House: And at the same Time to congratulate your Majesty upon your safe Return to Great Britain, and upon your resuming the Administration of these your Dominions so justly delegated to your Royal Consort; and so wisely conducted by Her during your Majesty's Absence,

Your Majesty's great Goodness and Consideration in recommending to our Care the Hempen and Flaxen Manufactures of this Kingdom, must excite in us the warmest Gratitude, when we reflect, that the particular Mark of Duty your Majesty expects from us, is to consult our own Interest, and to pursue our own Prosperity.

We are too sensible of the many Blessings we enjoy in common with our Fellow Subjects under your Majesty's auspicious Reign, to omit any Opportunity of expressing our Confidence in a Prince, who thinks a paternal Care of his People to be his truest Glory; and who chuses rather to make them the Envy, than the Terror of other Nations.

We have nothing more to desire than the Continuance of such Happiness, being fully convinced, That the Welfare and Safety of this Kingdom entirely depend upon your Majesty's sacred Person, and the Protestant Succession in your Royal House.

His Grace was pleased to return the Answer following.

I Will by the first Opportunity take Care to admit this dutiful and loyal Address, in order to be laid before His Majesty.

Hague, Nov. 29, N. S. The greatest Part of the Members of the States of Holland are arrived here to be present at the opening of the Assembly To-morrow. Most of the Imperial Troops that are to winter in the Low Countries, in the Country of Liege, the Dutchy of Juliers, and the Electorate of Cologne, are arrived in their respective Quarters. Some Parties of the Prussian Troops passing through the Bishoprick of Munster, and having committed some Disorders there, the Peasants charged and defeated them, having taken a Captain and several Soldiers Prisoners. The Spanish Ambassador here has received Letters from Madrid of the 14th of this Month, advising, that the French Ambassador there had notified to the Court of Spain, the Convention between the Emperor and the French King.
