BY Letters from Bozolo of the 21st of November we have an Account, that the Marquess de la Mina, whom the Duke de Montemar had sent to the Marshal de Noailles, to acquaint him that the Imperialists were in Motion, went back the 14th, having settled with the Marshal proper Measures for succouring the Spanish Troops if the Imperialists should make any Attempt against them. On the 15th the Marshal had Intelligence from the Duke de Montemar, that the Imperialists had passed the Lower Adige near Rovigo and Carpy, and that he required his Assistance to oppose them. The Marshal gave Orders immediately to his Troops to put themselves in Motion to assist the Spaniards, and was himself just setting out to join the Duke de Montemar, when by a Courier from France he received the King's Orders for a Cessation of Arms. This he communicated immediately the same Day to the Count de Kevenhuller, General of the Emperor's Troops. He also dispatched a Messenger to the Duke de Montemar, to acquaint him with the Reasons for not furnishing the Assistance he desired; and he sent Orders to his own Forces at all the advanced Posts to forbear Hostilities. General Kevenhuller returned Answer by a Trumpeter the 18th, that he had given Orders for the Cessation of all Hostilities. The Duke de Montemar drew off the Spanish Troops that were employed in the Blockade of Mantua, and having passed the Po, had posted himself with all his Forces at Revere.

Hague, Dec: 6, N. 8. The Marquess de Fenelon received by an Express from his Court on Saturday last, the Preliminary Articles of Peace between the Empetour and the French King. The said Marquess and the Emperor's Envoy have since had Conferences with the principal Ministers of the States; but nothing has yet been communicated to their Deputies for Foreign Affairs.
