HE General of Lithuania Prince Radzivil is made Castellan of Trock, M. Chodkenick Palatin of Breicz, M. Plater Palatin of Livonia, and M. Stanislaroski General Director of the Posts in Polish Prussia, vacant by the Death of M. Thioly. It was thought the Council (which was assembled after the Diet broke up) would have ended on Monday last, but their Resolutions not being finally settled, it was adjourn'd to this Day, when it was farther adjourn'd till To-morrow. M. Keyserling, her Czarish Majesty's Minister, has lately been thrice in Conference with the Commissaries of the Republick, to regulate anew the Quarters for the Russian Troops which remain in this Country, and the Contributions to be raifed for them in fuch a Manner that they may be the less burthensome to the Country; which is also one Reason for the Council's being continued till these Matters that he entirely admited shall be entirely adjusted.

Hague, Dec. 6, N. S. Letters from Dantzick of the 25th of November relate, that Count Potocki, Palatin of Volhinia, having gone out of Konigsberg under Pretence of taking the Diversion of Hunting some Leagues distant from that Place, had retired into the Bishoprick of Warmia, whence it was thought he would proceed to Warsaw, to make his Submission to King Augustus.
