**T**HE States of Holland are still assembled. The Conferences which have been held during this Assembly about the Promotion of General Officers are continued, the Deputies of the respective Provinces having not yet come to any Agreement thereupon. Three Days ago the Marquês de Fenelon received a Courier from his Court, and it is believed that he and the Imperial Minister Count d'Uhlefeld will communicate in a few Days to the States in Form the Preliminaries of the Treaty of Peace between the Emperor and the most Christian King.

Whitehall, Dec. 9, 1735.

Whereas two anonymous Letters without any Date were lately dropt in the Yard of Isaac Mallinger, of Elibam, in the County of Kent, Carpenter, ordering him to lay Ten Guineas at the North End of his Hay Stack, threatening, in Case of Non-compliance, to burn his Hay Stack, and do him other Damage; but that if he complied, he should there find a Writing that they had stolen from him some Time ago. The said Mallinger is also commanded by the said Letters to tell Sir Thomas Steavens to lay the like Sum under a Hay Stack near his Garden in Elibam aforesaid, the 22d Day of this Instant December, threatening, in Case of Refusal, that it shall be worse for him, and threatening, if they should set a Watch they should die for it: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the writing, dropping, or sending the said Letters, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any Person or Persons who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, who wrote, dropt, or sent the said Letters, or either of them, so as they be convicted thereof.
