Whereas the Nobility and Gentry of this Kingdom have heretofore been, and are at present distinguished by Coat Armour peculiar to their respective Families, but of late, to the great Abuse of Honour, which is derived alone from the Crown, divers Persons, as Undertakers, Painters, and others, have frequently presumed to marshal and direct the Proceedings at solumn Funerals without Regard to the Right of Arms; and likewise employ mean Persons to carry Trophies of Honour at such Funerals, which is the indisputable Right of his Majesty's Officers of Arms by Virtue of their Offices. It is unanimously agreed, at a Chapter held at the College of Arms this 8th Day of January, 1735-6, That if hereafter any Person or Persons shall presume to carry any such Trophies of Honour, or shall marshal or direct the Proceedings at any such Funeral, such Person or Persons shall be prosecuted with the utmost Severity according so Law.
