IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the ufual Solemnity, SirCharles Dalton, Gentleman-Uiher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Mellage from His Majefty to the Houle of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the Houle of Peers; the Com-mons being come thither accordingly, His Majefty was pleafed to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

 Γ HE happy Turn, which the Affairs of Europe have evidently taken fince the End of the laft Seffion of Parliament, muft, I am perfuaded, give you all, as it does Me, the greateft Satisfaction.

I acquainted you then that a Plan of Pacification, concerted between Me, and the States General of the United Provinces, had been proposed to the Parties engaged in the War, which had not the Effect to prevent the opening of the Campaign : The Armies took the Field, and the War was carried on in fome Parts, in fuch a Manner, as to give very just Apprehensions that it would unavoidably become general, from an abfolute Neceffity of preferving that Balance of Power on which the Safety and Commerce of the Maritime Powers fo much depend.

This Confideration determined Me to perfevere, jointly with the States, in repeating our most earnest Instances to the contending Parties to agree to an Armiffice, and to enter into a Negociation for obtaining a General Peace, upon the Basis of the Flan we had proposed to them.

Whilft Affairs continued in this State of Deliberation, the Heat and Fury of the War abated; and the Emperor, and the most Chriftian King, in Confequence of their repeated Profeisions of a fincere Disposition to put an end to the War by an honourable and folid Peace, concerted and agreed upon certain Preliminary Articles to answer that most defireable End. An Armiffice is fince agreed to by all the Parties engaged in the War; and the contracting Powers, in Regard to the good Offices imployed by Me and the States, have communicated to us, by their respective Ministers, the Preliminaries, desiring our Concurrence for effectuating a general Paci-

fication upon the Terms thereby flipulated. It appearing, upon due Examination, that these Articles do not effentially vary from the Plan proposed by Me and the States, nor contain any thing prejudicial to the Equilibre of Europe, or to the Rights and Interests of

our respective Subjects, we have thought fits in purfuance of our conftant Purpole, to contribute our utmost towards a general Pacification, to declare, by a joint Refolution, to the Courts of Vienna and France; our Ap-probation of the faid Preliminaries, and our Readinels to concur in a Treaty to be made for bringing them to Persection.

These Preliminaries have been likewife communicated to the Kings of Spain, and of Sardinia; and although those Princes have not as yet, in Form, declared their final Refolutions upon them, there is great Reafon to believe, that the Love of Peace, their avowed Difpolitions for putting an End to the Troubles of Europe, and the amicable Interpolition of Common Friends, will prevail upon them to agree to what has been thus concerted, upon reafonable Security gi-ven them, for the peaceable Polletion and Enjoyment of the Countries allotted to them.

In these Circumstances, my first Care was to eale the Burthens of my People, as foon, and as far, as Prudence, in the prefent Po-flure of Affairs, would permit. I have therefore ordered a confiderable Reduction to be made of my Forces, both by Sea and Land; and if the Influence of the Crown of Great Britain, and the Refpect due to this Nation; have had any Share in composing the prefent Troubles in Europe, or preventing new ones, I am perfuaded you will be of Opinion, that it will be necessary to continue some extraordinary Expence, until there be a more perfect Reconciliation among the feveral Powers of Europe.

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons, I have ordered the proper Officers to lay before you the Effimates for the Service of the current Year ; and I make no Doubt, but my Defire to make the Charge of the Publick as low as possible, will find in you the fame Rea-diness to grant the necessary Supplies with Chearfulness and Unanimity.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I am willing to hope this pleafing Profpect of Peace Abroad will greatly contribute to Peace and good Harmony at Home. Let that Example of Temper and Moderation, which has to happily calmed the Spirits of contending Frinces, banish from among you all in-testine Discord and Differition. Those who truly wish the Peace and Prosperity of their Country, can never have a more favourable Opportunity than now offers, of diffinguish-ing themfelves, by declaring their Satisfac-tion in the Progress already made towards reftoring the publick Tranquillity, and in promoting what is still necessary to bring it to Perfection.

Hagne, Jan. 14, N. S. The feveral Pro-vinces of this Republick having unanimoufly confented to the Declaration which was propofed to them to be made jointly by the King of Great Britain and this State, upon the Pre-liminary Articles of Peace which had been communicated to his Britannick Majefty and to their High Mightineffes by the Courts of Vienna and France, a final Refolution palled accordingly in the Allembly of the States General on Saturday last the 21st Instant ; which Refolution being that Day delivered, in the Name of the two Maritime Powers, to the Imperial and French Ministers, was by them immediately difpatched by Expresses to their respective Courts. This Morning the Spa-nilh Amballadour sent away a Courier for Madrid, with the States Anfwer to his late Memorial, and with a Declaration delivered to him and to the Sardinian Minister. In the mean time, Letters from Madrid of the 2d Inftant advise, that his Catholick Majesty had declared to the French Ambaffadour there, that he had refolved to comply with the Preliminaries. Count Uhlefeld is preparing to let out for Bruffels, there to meet Count Kinsky, who fet out from Vienna on the 9th Instant for England.
