TH E Duke of Lorrain is expected soon from Presbourg, in order, as 'tis said, to demand in Person the eldest Archdutchess in Marriage; after which the Day (though generally understood to be fixed for the 12th of next Month) will be declared for the Celebration of the Marriage, which the Emperour designs shall be with the greatest Magnificence, and Preparations are making accordingly. The States of the Kingdom of Bohemia have passed a Resolution to make a Present to that Princess of 120000 Florins; and 'tis expected the States of Upper and Lower Austria, and those of the other Hereditary Countries, will follow this Example. Prince Charles, and several other Persons of the first Rank at the Court of Lorrain, are expected here by the 26th Instant.

Berlin, Jan. 21, N. S. The French Minister the Marquess de la Chetardie, having lately put himself to a very great Expence to new furnish his House, it makes People here suspect that King Stanislaus will soon pass through this Town on his Return to France. The Quarrel between Major General Steinficht and Colonel Osten has been hushed up, according to our last Letters from Konigsberg; and King Stanislaus has promised that the Arrears due to the Officers who had served him should be fully paid before he leaves that Place. The Saxon Minister here says, that seven Saxon Regiments have received Orders to leave Poland; so that all the Foreign Troops then remaining in Poland, Ruffians and Saxons together, will not amount to more than 8000 Men. Young Count Schwerin, a Lieutenant in General Kalkenstein's Regiment, is appointed the King of Prussia's Minister at the Court of Denmark.
