**B**Y Letters from Petersbourg of the 17th of January we are told, that the last Account they had received from Field Marshal Count Munich, was, that he was arrived with his Army at Isum, in the Neighborhood of Asoph; that he had caused some Batteries to be erected there on the Side of the River which running by Asoph falls into the Black Sea, to hinder on occasion the Passage of any Vessels from that Sea to Asoph; for undertaking the Siege of which Place he was making great Preparations, in Case of a Rupture with the Ottoman Porte. On the other Hand, the latest Advices from Constantinople import, that the Turkish Court fought by all Means to avoid a Breach with the Russians; to which End, they had not only disavowed their having given any Orders to the Tartars to make the Motions they lately did towards the Frontiers of Muscovy, but had dispatched a Capigi Bathi or Messenger of State, to the Crimea, with Orders to the Tartar Kan to repair to Constantinople, which most People believed was in order to his being deposed. 'Tis advised from Vienna the 25th past, that the Preparations for the Marriage of the Archdutchess Maria Teresa with the Duke of Lorraine were continued with all Diligence, and that the Pope's Nuncio was to be present at the Nup-

tials, and perform the Ceremony of giving the Apostolical Benediction to the Bride and Bridegroom. Prince Eugene of Savoy had been very dangerously ill, but by the Assistance of the Chevalier Garelli, the Emperor's chief Physician, was in a fair Way of Recovery. Letters from Berlin of the 31st past relate, that it had been signified to the Polish Nobles and Gentlemen remaining at Konigsberg, that it was expected that before the necessary Passports for their safe Departure from thence were delivered to them, they should each of them in particular give Security for their furnishing two tall Men for the King of Prussia's Service, soon after their Return to Poland, in Acknowledgement of the seasonable Refuge and Retreat which his Prussian Majesty had granted them in his Dominions.
