THE Emperor has declared Count Wallis, the Duke d'Aremberg; and the Counts Hautois and Secken-dorff, Field Marshals. Yesterday his Imperial Majesty held a Council of State, when Baron Jodoci and the Archbishop of Colocsa took their Seats as Members of that Council. It is reported, that after Easter Prince Charles of Lorraine will set out on his Travels to some foreign Countries, and that on his Return he will be made Vicar-General of Hungary. It is also rumoured, that Prince Eugene is inclined to resign the Office of President of the Council of War, which in that Case will be given to Count Konigslegg, now Vice-President of that Council.

Hague, March 13, N. S. The States of the Province of Holland having disposed of the Civil and Military Employments in their Gift, have under Consideration many other domestick Affairs. The Grand Pensionary continues very much indisposed, so that he cannot give his Assistance in their Assembly. M. de Ginkel, Minister of this State at the Court of Berlin, has sent Advice, that the Prussian Ministers had signified to him, that according to the Report of the Officers upon an Inquiry concerning the Violences lately represented to have been committed in lifting Men into the Prussian Service in Guelderland, those Representations were groundless; and that particularly a Burgher of Nimeghen, who, it was complained, had been carried off by Force, had lifted himself voluntarily, and is therefore still detained. By Letters from Italy it is advised, that the

French have already quitted the Posts which they possessed on the Po and on the Oglio, and are retired towards Milan, to be in a Readiness to return to France as soon as the Season will permit; and that the Spaniards seem disposed also by their Motions to evacuate Tuscany. Great Preparations are making at Groningen for the Reception of the Prince and Princess of Orange, who are expected to make their publick Entry there next Week.
