Westminster, March 24.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting an Aid to his Majesty by a Land Tax to be raised in Great Britain for the Service of the Year 1736.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion; and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act to repeal the Statute made in the first Year of the Reign of King James the First, Intituled, An Act against Conjuraton, Witchcraft, and dealing with Evil and Wicked Spirits, except so much thereof as repeals an Act of the fifth Year of the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, against Conjuratons, Inchantments and Witchcrafts; and to repeal an Act passed in the Parliament of Scotland in the ninth Parliament of Queen Mary, Intituled, Auentis Witchcrafts; and for punishing such Persons, as pretend to exorcise, or use any kind of Witchcrafts, Sorcery, Inchantment or Conjuraton.

An Act to indemnify Persons, who have omitted to read the Prayers and make and subscribe the Declarations, directed to be read, made, and subscribed by the Act of Uniformity of the Thirteenth and Fourteenth Year of the Reign of King Charles the Second, within the Time limited by Law, and for allowing further Time for doing thereof.

An Act to amend an Act passed in the seventh Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, Intituled, An Act to preserve and encourage the Woollen and Silk Manufactures of this Kingdom; and for more effectual employing the Poor, by prohibiting the Use and Wear of all printed, painted, stained or dyed Callicoes in Apparel, Household-stuff, Furniture, or otherwise, after the 25th Day of December 1722, (except as is therein excepted) so far as relates to Goods made of Linnen Tarn and Cotton Wool manufactured in Great Britain.

An Act for the better regulating the night-ly Watch and Bedels within the Parish of St. Martin in the Fields, within the Liberties of the City of Westminster.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road leading from Saint Dunstan's Cross, near the City of Canterbury, to the Water-side at Whitstable, in the County of Kent.

An Act to explain and amend an Act passed in the First Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, Intituled, An Act for repairing and enlarging the Road leading from the House called the Sign of the Bells in the Parish of Saint Margarets in Rochester, to Maidstone, and other Roads therein mentioned, in the County of Kent.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the eleventh Year of his late Majesty King George the First, Intituled, An Act for repairing and amending the Road from Biggleswade in the County of Bedford to Bugden, and through Alconberry to the Top of Alconberry Hill or Cross Post leading into Sautery Lans on the York and Edinburgh Road, and from the said Town of Bugden to the Town of Huntingdon, and from Cross Hall in Eaton Soken in the said County of Bedford, to Great Stoughton Common in the said County of Huntingdon.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers granted by an Act passed in the Fifth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, Intituled, An Act for repairing the Road from Beconsfield in the County of Bucks, to Stoken Church in the County of Oxon.

And to two private Bills.

Copenhagen, March 27, N. S. His Danish Majesty has now declared his Intention to set out for Holstein in the Month of April, and has ordered both the Ministers of the Council, with M. Schulin, to attend him in that Progress. The Princess Charlotte has accepted his Majesty's Invitation to accompany him in this Journey. General Mornier is arrived here, but the Troops will not be so soon in Holstein as was expected. Count Holst, Son to the Grand Chancellor, is upon the Point of setting out for Mannheim, to terminate a Dispute which the General abovementioned had with the Elector Palatin upon the Subject of Winter Quarters. He is to make up this Matter, and at the same Time to renew the Demand of a very antient Debt due from the Palatin Family to the Danish Crown.

From thence he was introduced to a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, by the Master of the Ceremonies.

March 23. This Day he had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Duke.

March 24. This Day he had a private Audience of their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Amelia and Caroline.

March 25. This Day he had a private Audience of their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Mary and Louisa: To all which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

His Majesty has been pleased to constitute and appoint George Garnier, Esq; to be Apothecary General to His Majesty's Forces raised and to be raised for his Service, in the Room of Isaac Garnier, Esq; deceased.

Whereas His Majesty, by His Royal Proclamation, issued, by the Advice of His Privy Council, upon the 5th Day of February last, in order to bring the Persons to condign Punishment, who, in September last, had been guilty of wilfully and maliciously cutting down and destroying the Turnpikes at Leabury in the County of Hereford, erected by Authority of Parliament, and who were concerned in the Attack then made on the House of John Skipp, Esq; one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said County, and who had been since guilty of several other notorious Outrages and Disturbances in the said County of Hereford, particularly mentioned in the said Proclamation, was graciously pleased to promise a Pardon to any of the Persons concerned in the said Outrages, upon such Terms as are mentioned in the said Proclamation, provided they made such Discoveries, as are therein particularly mentioned, before the 10th Day of March then next ensuing: And was likewise graciously pleased to offer a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons, who, before the said 10th Day of March, should discover, and apprehend any of the Persons therein mentioned, or any other Person or Persons guilty of the Offences therein mentioned, so as he, she, or they might be convicted of the same. And whereas the Time for making such Discoveries is now past, and it hath been represented to His Majesty, That, in order to bring the said Offenders to Justice, it may be proper to enlarge the same, His Majesty therefore is pleased to enlarge the Time of such Discovery to the 3d Day of April next, and is hereby graciously pleased to promise the like Pardon, and to give the same Reward, as is mentioned in the said Proclamation, to any Person or Persons, as shall make such effectual Discoveries, as are therein mentioned, at any Time before the Third Day of April next, and upon the same Terms and Conditions, as is mentioned and expressed in the said Proclamation.
