Berlin, May 22, N. S.

LAST Sunday at Noon the King of Prussia dined again with King Stanislaus at the French Minister's. In the Evening there was Court at Montbijou, where King Stanislaus was entertained at Supper by the Queen of Prussia, and the next Morning he set out on his Journey to France. No Honours were paid that Prince on his Arrival, but on his Departure he was saluted by a triple Discharge of the Cannon on the Ramparts. Colonel Truchses accompanies him, on the Part of his Prussian Majesty, to Guelder; to which Place that Prince is to be defrayed at the King of Prussia's Expence, and Count Truchses has received 3000 Dollars for that Purpose. His Prussian Majesty made King Stanislaus a Present of a fine Coach and eight Prussian Horses: The Coach is valued at 2000 Dollars, and the Horses at as much. His Prussian Majesty is now taken up in reviewing his Regiments singly, and these Reviews will last till the latter End of next Week; after which he designs to go to Magdebourg to examine the State and Condition of that Fortrels, and to pass in Review the Regiments quartered there and in that Neighbourhood. This Court has received from Vienna the agreeable News, that the Empeour, at his Prussian Majesty's Instances, had revoked the Orders lately published against Prussian Recruiters, so far as related to the King of Prussia's own Regiment of tall Grenadiers.

Hague, June 4, N. S. The States have resolved to acknowledge King Augustus of Poland, by answering his Letter of Notification to them of his Establishment on that Throne; they have also resolved to send an Answer to a Letter from King Stanislaus, signifying his Acquiescence in that Establishment. The Opinions of the Provinces touching the Reduction of the Forces of this State being return'd, it was propos'd Yesterday, in the Assembly of the States General, to make the Reform of the Troops commence on the 8th of July; but upon some Objection of the Province of Friseland, the Conclusion of this Matter is referred to Monday next. King Stanislaus came to Wesel the 29th past, and the next Day proceeded to Guelder on his Way to Paris.

His Majesty has been pleased to order a Bill to be prepared for his Royal Signature, to pass the Great Seal, containing his Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of His Cathedral Church of St. Asaph, empowering them to chuse a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Death of Dr. Thomas Tanner late Bishop thereof. As likewise a Letter to be prepared for His Royal Signature, recommending unto the said Dean and Chapter Isaac Maddox, Doctor in Divinity, to be by them elected Bishop of that See.

His Majesty has been pleased to grant unto David Gregory, Doctor in Divinity, the Place and Dignity of a Canon of his Cathedral Church of Christ in his Univerfity of Oxford, in the Room of Dr. Thomas Tanner, deceased.
