Falmouth, Jan. 20.

**T** Here came in here about 60 Sail of French Merchant men, under Convoy of two French men of War, bound for *Hauve de Grace*.

*Plymouth, Jan. 23.* This day was brought in here upon Suspicion the *Emanuel*, pretending her self, of *Hambrough*, *Peter Bustin* Master, by His Majesty's Ship the *Morning Star*. The 24 came in here the Ship called the *City of Tper*, from *Burdeaux*, bound for *Ostend*.

*Hurwich, Jan. 25* Yesterday the Packet-Boat, that went hence on Thursday, returned, not being able to endure the weather, which has of late been very severe, with a strong Easterly Wind, so as we may expect suddenly to hear they are strogly frozen up in *Holland*.

*Deale, Jan. 26.* These three days and nights last past, the Winds have been very violent, blowing a very high Gale between the North-East, and East by North; yet, God be praised, not any harm is done to any of His Majesty's Ships, or other Ships in the Downs.

*Rauvbonne, Jan. 12.* The fourth of this month the young Count de *la Gardie*, Envoy Extraordinary of *Sweden*, arrived here. He hath already declared his Proposition, touching the Mediation of the King his Master, for a Peace between the King of *Great Brittain*, his most Christian Majesty, and their Allies, on one side, and his Imperial Majesty, the King of *Spain*, the *United Provinces*, and the Confederate Princes on the other; which was received with much joy by the States of the Empire, here assembled. The Armies of the Emperor and the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, having passed the one through *Horne*, the other through *Frankenbergh*, into *Westphalia*, it was resolved, that the former of these two Armies, after having conducted the other into *Westphalia* should separate from it, and take its Quarters in the Countrey of *East Friesland*, and that General *Montecuculi* was to return to *Vienna*. Mean while 'tis not believed, that Monsieur de *Turenne*, who hath pass'd the *Rhine* with the French Army, towards the Countrey of *Westphalia*, will suffer them so easily, to take those Quarters, especially in the Territories of the Allies of his most Christian Majesty, which the said Monsieur de *Turenne* is gone to defend, having as is said, order to give them Battle, if they shall attempt to lodge themselves there.

*Vipna, Jan. 15.* We hear out of *Hungary*, that the Rebels are recruiting afresh, which hath obliged the General *Cops* to recall the Regiments of *Strenbergh* and *Strasoldy*, that had begun to march away. And seeing that the Rebels will not yet be quiet, all the Regiments that were in *Upper Hungary*, must remain there; for which end the said General is to have the supreme Command of the Forces of that Kingdom. The Emperors is certainly with Child.

*Zelles Jan. 16.* The Dukes of *Brunswick* and *Lunenburgh*, have deputed some Commissioners to the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, to sollicite him, that their Countrey may be not damnified by his Army.

*Madrid, Jan. 18.* The King of *Spain* is now perfectly recover'd of the small Pox to the great joy of this Court, but doth not yet stir out of his chamber. From *Seville* the 10th instant they write, that the French Squadron under the Command of the Count d' *Estré*, consisting of ten Men of War, and two Fireships, had been some days in the Bay of *Cadix*, and caused great apprehension of a design against the Gallions, which, according to the best calculation, would now in few weeks appear upon that coast. This fear is much increased by a report of 14 Frigats more expected from *Thoulon*, and ordered to joyn with the others. But 'tis also said that for the security of those Gallions, there are equipping 8 or 10 Ships of the Royal Armada, and that three Dutch Men of War come from the *Streights* some time since, are to joyn with them under the Spanish Banner. Mean time, some small Vessels are making ready in extraordinary haste, with Orders, as 'tis conjectured, to direct the said Gallions to some Port of *Biscay* or *Gallicia*. From *Tangier* we have advice, that his Excellency the Lord *Middleton*, had dispatched away, in order to adjust a Peace with *Gailan*, several Commissioners, who promised themselves no ill success in their Negotiation, from the extraordinary kindness and respect wherewith they were treated by the People of the Countrey in their way. 'Tis added, that *Gailan* did reside at *Alcazar*, not adventuring to proceed further, till he shall have increased his Forces to a more considerable number. From *Malaga* the 3 instant we hear, that there they had news, that the Commissioners of *Tangier* had concluded a most advantageous peace with *Gailan*; though the particulars are not yet known. The same is confirmed by our Letters from *Cadix* of the first instant.

*Genoa January 18.* Monsieur de *Gaumont* the French Envoy, returned hence for *Turin* the 14 instant; and the same day arrived here the *Dolphin*, a Dutch Capers, being come in to repair her damages, which she received from an *Algerine*; whom she met with off *Corfica*, and by whom she was so torn, that she is altogether disabled to sail at present; besides, she hath 20 of her Men dangerously wounded. Here they are still raising Souldiers; yet it is publicly said, that the Peace with *Savoy* is so referred to the most Christian King that 'tis as good as concluded. The Present here made to Monsieur *Gaumont*, is valued to be worth at least 2000 pounds Sterling. One only man of War goes now for *Spain*. The *Madrid* Letters say, that 20 French men of War were cruising off of *Cadix*, which gave them some fears. From *Leghorne* 'tis advised, that two Pilliard Ships were there arrived, who left their Convoy about *Cadix*.

*Brussels, Jan. 22.* The high Waters have somewhat damnified the Fortification of *Vilvoerden*; which we labour to repair. Mean time our Leavies go on vigorously.

*Antwerp, Jan. 23.* From *Hull* and the Neighbouring parts, we are informed, that by the late violent Storms, and the high Water, the *Polder* is broke through, as also certain Dykes; which hath caused great

great damages, so that even a point of the Counter-carp of the Town of *Hulst*, had been wash'd away with the Inundation.

*Hague, Jan. 27.* Our Preparations for the War proceed vigorously, of which tis said the Burghers are to make the greatest part. The design is variously discours'd of, most say, 'tis upon *Nirecht*. A little before *Christmas* there went away from *Amsterdam*, five *East-India* Ships, attended with a Convoy. We hear that those of *Friesland* are dissatisfied with *Holland* for having contributed so more to their defence. The People here have already paid five times the two hundredth penny; and Order is now issued for laying a much more considerable Tax for the carrying on the War this next Spring.

*Ditto, Jan. 31.* After that the Counts of *Waldeck*, of *Nassau*, and *Hora* had been for some hours private with th. Prince of *Orange*, his Highness attended with those Generals went from hence this day to *Honflardyc*, there to divert himself a little with Hunting. The 23 instant two Bores were brought hither prisoners, upon the accusation of having kept correspondence with the Enemy. The 28 were carried from hence 32 Guns, prepared and tryed by Prince *Maurice* of *Nassau*, which are said to be intended for the approaching Expedition.

*Amsterdam, Jan. 27.* 'Tis said that the *Mareschal de Turenne* is come into *Velow*, and that many Troops were marching for *Nirecht*. What is said of *Munster*, is groundless.

*Paris, Jan. 26.* The King has given the Abbeys of *Orcan* and *Bonport* to the young Count *d'Eu*, second Son of the Duke of *Enguien*. The Court is most taken up with the Preparations for the next Campaign, his Majesty having ordered all the Governors of the Conquered places in *Flanders*, and of the several Governments upon the frontiers of *Picardy*, the *Low-Countries*, and *Catalonia*, to repair speedily to their respective charges; as also to all the Officers of his Forces forthwith to attend every Man his Duty, upon pain of being cashiered. His Majesty hath likewise Commanded all the Captains of Ships who are named to serve upon his Fleet in this next Summers service, to render themselves aboard their Ships, and to be ready to put to Sea the beginning of *March* next. The *Marquis de Seignelay* has likewise Order to be going about the beginning of *Leut* towards *Rochefort*, to see the Squadron, consisting of 30 great Ships, besides Fireships, that are to serve at Sea this next Campaign, in a readiness.

*Ditto, Jan. 28.* From *Brussels* of *Jan. 22.* we are made believe, that *Don Bernabado de Salinas* was parted from thence for *England*, with a Commission from his Excellency the Count of *Mazarin*, to His Majesty the King of *Great Britain*, but of what tenor is not said. Further, that the said Count continues to employ all his cares for the finding a Fond necessary for the new Levies, which are now going about with all vigor.

The two Envoys Extraordinary, of *Bavaria* and *Neuburg*, took their respective leaves of their Majesties and of the Dolphin, some days since, at *S. Germain*, the latter of these two Envoys having thanked his Majesty for the *Abby of Fecan*, confer'd upon the death of the late King *Casimir*, on one of the Sons of that Duke. The 24<sup>th</sup> the Dolphin was a little indisposed, but the next morning (God be thanked) was very well again. The 26 their Royal Highnesses return'd to their Majesties at *S. Germain*, after the two Envoys

of *Bavaria* and *Neuburg* had also taken their leaves of them. The King hath lately pass'd an Edict for suppressing 30 of the Advocates of the Council, prohibiting at the same time those that are continued; the further execution of that Office. The *Chevalier de Rohan* is sent to the *Bastille*, upon the account of the old difference between him and the *Chevalier de Lorrain*.

*Plymouth, Jan. 26.* Last night the *Resolution* Frigate being out at Sea, a Dutch Caper of 5 Guns, mistaking her for a Merchantman, and greedy of the prey, came as if he would have laid her on board, but he quickly found his mistake, being immediately taken by the *Resolution*, and brought in to this Port.

*Weymouth, Jan. 27.* The *Wapen of Armes* of *Horne*, burthen about 700 Tuns, having 270 Men on Board, and 32 Guns Mounted, came from *Holland* about 7 weeks since, and bound for *Eatavia* in the *East-Indies*, meeting with fowl weather about *Cape Finister*, was forced to put back again as far as the *Scames*, where the lost four Cables, and as many Anchors, and having but on left her, intended to return for *Holland* if possible, but growing extream leaky, at the height of the *Isle of Wight*, they were forced yesterday to run her on shore under *Portland* Castle, within Musket shot of the Castle, where she now lies, having 7 Foot Water in Hold, but may 'tis thought, be gotten off the next Spring Tide. Her Lading we do not yet know, it is said to be in part, Lead, Iron, Rhenish Wines, Brandy, Sack, Cables and Anchors, besides 70 Barrels of Powder; near 40 of her Men are dead by sickness since she came out.

*Whitehal, Jan. 26.* This day His Majesty, after a Solemn hearing of Mr. *William Muschamp*, one of the Farmers of *Ireland*, upon several pretended Objections against the Lord Viscount *Ranelagh's* Undertaking; the said *Muschamp*, not being able to make out any one particular, and His Majesty being fully satisfied with the said Lord *Ranelagh's* Proceedings, was pleas'd to Order the said *William Muschamp*, to be sent and kept a close Prisoner in the *Gatehouse*, as guilty of false Accusations, and endeavoring to disturb His Majesties Service.
