Whitehall, May 27.

Yesterday at Eight a Clock in the Evening, a Midshipman belonging to his Majesty's Sloop the Fly, dispatched from Lowestoff in Suffolk at Six in the Morning by the Captain of that Ship, arrived here, with an Account that the King, who sailed from the Gunfleet on Monday the 24th Instant about Nine at Night, arrived on the Coast of Holland the next Day, and was sailing into Helvoetsluys at Two in the Afternoon. And this Morning at Six a-Clock a Messenger dispatched by his Excellency Horatio Walpole, Esq; his Majesty's Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the States General, brought an Account, that his Majesty landed safely at Helvoetsluys on Tuesday last between Two and Three in the Afternoon, and immediately proceeded on his Journey towards Hanover.

Dublin Castle, May 19.

The 17th Instant his Grace the Duke of Dorset, Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom, embarked for England; upon which Occasion, the Foot Forces on Duty here lined the Streets, and his Grace was attended by the Dragoon Forces likewise on Duty, together with the Battle-axe Guards, and Officers of State, to the Water Side; to which Place his Grace was accompanied by a great Number of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction; and this Day his Grace the Lord Primate, the Lord Chancellor, and the Speaker of the House of Commons, were sworn in Council as Lords Justices of this Kingdom.
