THE following Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Free Burgesses, and principal Inhabitants of the Borough of Saltash in Cornwall, has been presented to the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, Guardian of the Kingdom of Great Britain, by the Right Hon. the Lord Viscount Glenorchy, and Thomas Corbett, Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, being introduced by the Right Hon. the Earl of Grantham her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain: Which Address her Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously, and to order, that it should be transmitted to the King at Hanover.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

May it please your Majesty,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Free Burgesses, and Inhabitants of the Borough of Saltash in Cornwall, do humbly beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty upon the Marriage of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales with a Princess of the most illustrious House of Saxe Gotha.

Your Majesty's paternal Care of your People has been conspicuous in every Part of your mild and gracious Government, but in this joyful Instance you have extended the Prospect of our Felicity down to our Posterity, and have laid the Foundations of the same Blessings to our Children, which we enjoy under your Majesty's Protection in our civil and religious Liberties.

That your Majesty may long continue over us, and that their Royal Highnesses (imitating the great Example of Virtue in their august Parents) may be equally happy in each other, and in a numerous Progeny, are the most ardent Wishes and Prayer of your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects.

Warsaw, May 30. We have Advice that M. Stadnicki, who was some time since appointed Minister from King Augustus to the Ottoman Court, but was refused to be admitted in that Character, and sent to Adrianople, has been desired by that Court to return to Constantinople; which Incident is looked upon as a Mark of the Turks beginning to soften in Favour of King Augustus. The Prince of Lubomirski, Palatin of Cracovia, is arrived here from Vienna. The Russian Minister did some Days since give a Memorial to the Polish Ministry, desiring them to issue the necessary Orders for the Subsistence of the Russian Troops that are returning from Germany to join the Army under the Command of Felt Marshal Count Munich. Letters from Dantzick give an Account, that the Saxons delivered up the Fort of Wexelmund to that Town the 22d Instant.

Hambourg, June 6, N. S. His Danish Majesty has not since his Arrival at Altena stirred out of his Bedchamber; his Complaint at first was of a Cold, a Pain in his Head, and a Restlessness occasioned by internal Heat, which kept him from sleeping; these Symptoms alarmed every Body with the Fear of his having the Small Pox, which are very rife in the Towns he passed through; but that Apprehension is entirely over, since the Distemper appears to be a common Ague and Fever. His Danish Majesty begins to rest better a Nights, and the Returns of his Ague, which are every other Day, are shorter and more gentle, and come each Time somewhat later than the former; so that there is great Reason to hope this Indisposition will neither prove dangerous, nor of a long Continuance.
