HE following Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs, and Commonalty of the City of Cork, having been transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Dorset, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has by him been presented to the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, Guardian of the Kingdom of Great Britain, &c: Which Address her Majesty was pleased to receive very gracioufly, and to order, that it should be transmitted to the King at Hanover.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs, and Commonalty of the City of Cork.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, with great Joy and most grateful Hearts, embrace the present happy Occafion of expressing the deep sense we have of the Peace and Prosperity of your Majesty's happy Reign over us, especially of the late signal Blessing of the Mariage of his Royal

Highness the Prince of Wales.

One happy Event treads upon the Heels of another: We were lately charmed with your Majesty's Goodness in bestowing the Princess Royal on his Highness the Prince of Orange, fo much to the Satisfaction of all your Subjects, who had a just Commemoration of the Bleffings procured for and transmitted to us by his Predecessor King William of glorious Memory, which is now succeeded by another happy Marriage equally agreeable to your People.

Your Majesty having disposed of his Royal Highness to a Princess adorned with many sublime Virtues and Accomplishments, a Branch of the illustrious House of Saxe Gotha, always famous for their firm Attachment to the Protestant Religion and Interest; we are thereby fully convinced and assured of your Royal Intentions to transmit down in Sasety to the latest Posterity, our Religion,

Laws, Liberties, and Properties.
In Gratitude therefore for fuch Bleffings, and the Prospect of their Duration and Continuance, we think ourselves indispensibly obliged to return our hearty Thanks and Acknowledgements to your most facred Maje-fly, for your Princely Care and Vigilance for the Good of your People, manifested in so

many fignal Instances.

We heartily congratulate your Majesty on the present happy Occasion; That Heaven may imile on this auspicious Union, and reward the same with a numerous and glorious Offspring, adorn'd with all Virtues becoming fo high a Descent; That your Majesty's Coun-fels may be attended with Wisdom, and crowned with Success and Prosperity in their Events; That your Kingdoms may flourish in Peace; That the Government as it is now established in Church and State, may continue inviolate and undisturbed; And that your Majesty and your Posterity after you, may enjoy a long and glorious Reign over us, are the fincere Prayers of your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects.

Petersbeurg, May 15. We have Advice, that Felt Marshal Munich is actually marched to the Crimea with 50 Regiments of regular Troops, which make in this Country near 60000 Men, besides a great Number of Cossacks and Tartars. Some say he is gone the direct Way through the Defert to the Precop; and others, that he is gone along the Banks of the River Nieper, though this last is much the longest Way, for the Conveniency of having his Artillery, Provisions, and heavy Baggage carried Part of the Way by Water. Some Days ago a Courier arrived here from the Russian Camp before Asoph, with Advice, that the Artillery was at last arrived from Pauloff, and that General Felt-Marshal Lacy, who is to command the Siege, was expected there the 6th Instant. The King of Denmark has recalled from this Court his Minister Count Dehn, who is in a very ill State of Health, and not able to bear the Coldness of this Climate.

Hanover, June 15, N. S. On Tuesday the 5th Instant, his Majesty landed at Helvoetfluys at Two in the Afternoon, under a tripple Discharge of the Cannon; and went immediately in a Coach for the Brille, where he was faluted by a Difcharge of the Cannon from the Ramparts; and crossed over to Maeslandsluys; from whence his Majesty proceeded to Utrecht; and arrived there between Nine and Ten in the Evening, and rested at M. Pouchoud's his Commissary at that Place. The next Morning being Wednesday the 6th, his Majesty set forward about Five, and came to Ippenbuhren that Evening, where he lay. The next Morning being Thursday the 7th, his Majesty set out from thence for Stolzenau, attended by Parties of Dragoons of his own Troops, and got thither that Evening, where he supped and rested that Night. And the next Morning, Friday the 8th, his Majesty fet out for Herrenhausen about Six, and arrived there the same Morning at Nine in perfect Health, and was received and complimented by the Regency, and a great Number of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction. Yesterday in the Asternoon his Excellency Horatio Walpole, Esq; his Majesty's Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the States General, whom his Majesty has been pleased to appoint to attend him during his Stay in his German Dominions, arrived here from the Hague, and in the Evening waited on his Majesty at Herren-
