ON the 27th past in the Evening, Count Kinski, the Emperour's Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, arrived here from England; as did also the next Day M. de Loß, Envoy Extraordinary from Poland and Saxony, and have had their respective Audiences of his Majesty; as have likewise M. de Wulkenitz, Envoy from Hesse Cassel, and M. Demay, Secretary from the Elector Palatine.

Whitehall, June 25, 1736.

Whereas several anonymous Letters have been wrote to Mr. James Bodicoate, of Peckhams, in the Parish of Camberwell, and County of Surry, and to Elizabeth Cock his Servant, threatening to destroy the said Bodicoate and Cock, and the House of the said Bodicoate, particularly one Letter, demanding the Sum of Twenty Guineas to be laid under the Corner of the Yew Hedge of the said Bodicoate, six Inches behind the Scraper coming in at the Fore-gate, by the 24th Day of April last, and in case of Refusal, threatening that the House, Person and Servant of the said Bodicoate should be destroyed, and all that he had, by the First of May: And whereas on the 30th Day of the said Month of April, the said Elizabeth Cock was assaulted, robbed and most barbarously abused in an Out-house of the Garden of the said Bodicoate, by three Men and one Woman, who, as it appeared, intended to rob the Dwelling-House of the said Bodicoate: Her Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Felonies, or either of them, is graciously pleased to promise His Majesty's Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement to any Person or Persons who shall discover such Offender or Offenders, Her Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds, to be paid upon the Conviction of each and every of them.
