To the Queen's most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bailiffs and Burgeffes of the ancient Borough of Milborn Port, having a just Seule of the Happiness we enjoy under the mild and aufpicious Reign of his most fa-cred Majesty, do beg Leave, in the most du-tiful Manner, to return our Thanks and Congratulations for his late paternal Care for the Safety and Well being of the Kingdoms, in marrying his Royal Highnels to a Princefs, whole Virtues fet ber in the faireft Point of Light; and we humbly hope, the wife Intentions of his most facred Majesty, and the Expectation of all his faithful Subjects, will be answered, by delivering down to latest Pofterity the Crowns of Great Britain and Ireland, in the illustrious House of Hanover : Which is the fincere and hearty Wifh of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects and Servants.

Pctersbourg, June 5. On Wednelday laft, the 2d Inftant, in the Morning, Felt Marshal Count Munich's Adjutant-General arrived here, with the great and agreeable News, that his Excellency and the Prince of Heffe-Hombourg, with about 30000 regular Troops, and 15000 Coffacks, (the reft of the Army not being come up,) attacked on the 20th paft, by Break of Day, the Earthen Wall called the Perceop, possible by the Tartars, which is eight Fathom high, and about five Earlish Miles long reaching from the Palus English Miles long, reaching from the Palus Meotis to the Black Sea, which is a very deep dry Ditch, 25 Fathom broad; and that the Russians, with their Chevaux de Frize and Pikes fixed together, instead of Ladders, had fcaled the faid Wall, and made themfelves Masters thereof, after a Dispute of four or five Hours, notwithstanding it was defended by above 80000 Tartars and Turks, at the Head of which was the Tartar Cham. That what greatly contributed to the taking this important Pais with lo much Eafe, was Felt-Marthal Munich's having made a falfe Attack at the End of the Wall, where the Tartar Cham was, in Perfon, which drew the greatest Strength of the Turks and Tartais to that Side, and by this Stratagem,

the West End being not fo well guarded, the Ruffians got over the Wall there ; which they had no fooner done, than the Tartar Cham and his Troops fled with fuch Precipitation, that Seventy Pieces of their Cannon were taken by the Muscovites, as was also the Cham's Tent, two of his Coaches, and all his Baggage. A great many Janizaries were killed in the Action, and feveral others made Prifoners of War, in four or five of the Towers that are on the Wall. About two Hours after the Arrival of the above Account here, the Cannon of the Citadel and Admiralty were fired, and her Czarian Majefty went to the Church in the Citadel to return Almighty God Thanks for the great Advan-tage her Arms had gained over the Tartars. Hambourg, June 28, N.S. The Length of the King of Denmark's Illneis, together

with the Want of Forage and Provisions, having obliged the Court to think of fending the Troops (which on their Return from the Rhine encamped near Ottensen) into their respective Quarters, the Secretary at War re-viewed the Foot fome Days ago, and the Horfe Yesterday, fince when they have be gun to march off; fo that the whole Camp will probably be difperfed by To-morrow. The Ratifications of the Treaty lately con-cluded between the Crown of Denmark and this City of Hambourg, were duly exchanged on the 25th Instant, and the Senate here have published an Edict (to take Place the 25th of June next Year) whereby the current Bank, and the Money Edict relating to it, are abolished, and the Danish Coin restored to the fame free Course which it had here till the His Danish Majesty, upon fign-Year 1710. Orders for opening the Commerce with this City, and accordingly the Guards which were posted to prevent the Exportation of any Goods from hence into the King of Denmark's Dominions, were removed; and it is now looked upon, that the whole Affair of the Difputes which have been fo long troublesome between his Danish Majesty and this Town, is as good as finished, what remains to be adjusted by separate Articles being of no great Confequence, and there being no Doubt but the Senate will continue to use fuch a diferent Behaviour in those and other Matters, that they may entirely regain the good Graces of his Danish Majesty, and live in good Neighbourhood with that Prince. The Senate's Edict is dated the 25th, the Day that the King of Denmark figned the Ratification of the Convention, but it was not published till the Day following, and the fame Evening Orders were fent to Denmark to releafe the Hambourger Ships at Copenhagen.

Hambourg, July 3, N. S. The King of Denmark having recovered Strength within these few Days, past, and being now entirely rid of his Diftemper, has appointed To-morrow to give Audience to the foreign Ministers. Hague,



Hague July 6, N. S. The States of Holland now affembled will feparate To-morrow, only for a few Days; Wednefday next being the usual Time of their Meeting, when they will difpofe of the civil and military Employ-ments now vacant in their Gift. There are many Sollicitors for that of Secretary for Holland, which is faid to be worth 8 or 10000 Livres per Annum. M. Borck, his Pruffian Majefty's Minister to the King of Great Britain, fet out from hence on Saturday last for Hanover.
