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Berlin, July 17, N. S.

**G**eneral Ginkel, the Dutch Minister at this Court, has obtained Leave of the States General to return to Holland. Letters of the 2d of June, O. S. which have been received here from Constantinople, give an Account, that the Ottoman Porte had had Advice, both by Sea and Land, of the Surrender of Asoph; but the last Dispatches from Petersburg, from whence that Piece of News might have come a great deal sooner, mention nothing of it; and only advise, that all the Conditions of Peace between the Turks and Kouli Kan were settled, one only excepted, which related to the Muscovites; Kouli Kan insisting that they be included in the Treaty, which the Turks peremptorily refuse, pretending the Difference in Religion makes it improper.

*Hanover, July 22, N. S.* On Wednesday last M. Borck, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia, arrived here from England, and waited the next Day on his Majesty at Herenhausen. Yesterday about Eight in the Morning, the King, attended by the whole Court, and several of the Foreign Ministers, went to Wiffenbrook Forest near Celle, where his Majesty took the Diversion of spearing and shooting several wild Boars, and returned to Herenhausen about Four in the Afternoon.

*Hanover, July 24, N. S.* Yesterday about Seven in the Evening Prince William of Hesse arrived here, and immediately waited on his Majesty at Herenhausen. Count Ilenburg, Chambellan to the King of Denmark, who came hither on the Part of his Danish Majesty with a Compliment to the King, took his Audience of Leave last Night, and set out this Morning for Hambourg on his Return to Copenhagen.

*Hague, July 24, N. S.* There is yet no Day fixed for the Return of the States of Holland. M. Booy, who was lately appointed one of their Secretaries of State, took upon himself this Day the Exercise of that Office. Yesterday the Deputies of the States, in a Conference with Count Golowkin, communicated to that Minister the Letter they had received from the Grand Vizier, and their Answer to it. They likewise delivered to Mr. Trevor, Secretary to the British Embassy here, the Resolution they had taken upon that Subject. Letters received here a few Days since from Constantinople, say, that the Turks have demanded the Mediation of the Maritime Powers to negotiate a Peace with the Muscovites.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice to all such Widows, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, as also with the Clerks of the Chreque at Deptford and Woolwich, and the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Carbet, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governours of the said Charity intending to distribute some Relief to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, and whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment; These are to give Notice to all such Widows, to repair or send to the above-mentioned Places, that they may be provided with the proper Certificates. And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they shall meet at this Office on Tuesday the 14th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, in order to receive and adjust the Claims of all such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
