Petersbourg, June 29.

A Courier arrived here two Days ago from Felt Marshal Lacy, with Letters dated the 8th Instant, which advise, that one of the Powder Magazines in Afoph had been blown up by a Bomb; that the Garrison had made another Sally out of the Town, and had been repulsed, in which Action Felt Marshal Lacy received a slight Wound in the Thigh by a Musket Ball. That the said General carries on the Siege with such Success, as leaves no Room to doubt his being very soon Master of the Place. The same Day a Courier arrived here in 14 Days from Felt Marshal Munich, with the agreeable News of his having taken the Town of Kosloff, a Place of great Trade, and which has a good Harbour; that there were in the said Town a great many Greeks and Armenians, and some Jesuits, which last are retired to Constantinople. Count Munich mentions, that he was proceeding with his Army in order to attack Bachisaray, the Capital of Crimea, and Residence of the Cham, which he expected soon to take, it being only fortified with an Earthen Wall. The Czarina also received Advice two Days ago from Perecop, that General Leontoff had taken Kuinbour, a Place of great Importance, being situated on the Mouth of the River Nieper on the Crimea Side. A Courier is just now arrived from the Camp before Afoph, with Advice, that the Governor of that Place had sent four Officers to Felt Marshal Lacy in order to capitulate; so that this Court expects every Minute to hear of the Town's being surrendered. A Minister from Persia is arrived here, and had an Audience of the Czarina the 26th Instant, in which he notified to her Majesty, that Thomas Kouli Kan had ascended the Throne of Persia, and was now called Sophy Nadyr.

Hanover, July 22, N. S. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Henry Cope, Esq; to be Lieutenant Governor of the Town and Garrison of Placentia, in Newfoundland in America, in the Room and Place of Samuel Gledhill, Esq; deceased; and also to appoint William Kennedy Esq; to be Deputy Governor of the Town, Castle and Fort of Inverness, in North Britain, and of all the Military Works and Fortifications thereunto belonging, in the Room of James Cunningham, Esq; deceased. His Majesty has likewise been pleased to appoint Charles Legge, Esq; to be first Major, Tobias Cramer, Esq; second Major, James Stuart, Esq; Captain, and Charles Ingram, Esq; Captain Lieutenant, in the third Regiment of Foot Guards commanded by the Right Hon. John Earl of Dunmore.

Berlin, July 24, N. S. Baron Brackel has received an Estaffette from his Court, with an Account, that on the 20th of last

Month, O. S. Afoph had surrendered to Felt Marshal Lacy, and that all the Garrison had been made Prisoners of War. The same Advices add, that by Count Munich's last Journal it appear'd he was Master of all Crim Tartary, except Caffa and Bachisaray the Capital of that Country. From Turkey they write that the Grand Vizier, with the Army under his Command, was in full march towards Bender. We hear from Prussia, that his Prussian Majesty was to be at Konigsberg as this Day or To-morrow; and that he would not be back at his Residence here before the 9th or 10th of next Month.

Hanover, July 29, N. S. On Thursday last in the Evening, Prince William of Hesse took his Leave of his Majesty at Herenhausen, and set out the next Morning from hence for Cassel, extremely well satisfied with the great Honours and Respect paid him during his Highness's Stay here.

Hague, July 31, N. S. Count Golowkin had an Account from Petersbourg by the last Post, that Afoph had surrendered by Capitulation on the 1st Instant, N. S. the Garrison being made Prisoners of War. He has notified the same to the States, who sent their Agent Yesterday to compliment him on that Occasion. Count Poniatowsky was expected here last Night from Amsterdam, where he has been some Time. There is yet no Day fixed for the Return of the States of Holland. Count Uhlefeld was informed last Post from Brussels, that his Mother, Grande Maitresse to the Governante, was a dying.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice to all such Widows, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbet, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governours of the said Charity intending to distribute some Relief to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, and whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment; These are to give Notice to all such Widows, to repair or send to the above-mentioned Places, that they may be provided with the proper Certificates. And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they shall meet at this Office on Tuesday the 14th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, in order to receive and adjust the Claims of all such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
