Berlin, September 4, N. S.

Baron Brackel, the Russian Minister here, has been so ill these eight Days past, as not to be able to see any Company. Since the Court of Russia's being at Petershoff, this Gentleman's Accounts of the Operations of his Mistress's Troops in the Crimea have not come to him so regularly as they used to do before: His last Advices mention only the Return of Count Munich to the Lines of Perecop; and that besides the great Heats which obliged the said General to think of refreshing his Army, it was, to make a Junction with Felt Marshal Lacy, that they might, both together, be the better able to make Head against the Turks, who were advancing very fast towards the Dnieper. It is said Baron Polnitz is to be sent to Dresden with his Prussian Majesty's Letter of Recognition of King Augustus; and that soon after, Major General Count Truchses, who has been often employed in the Affairs of Poland, will be sent with Compliments of Congratulation to his Polish Majesty, and reside at that Court as his Prussian Majesty's Minister. The King of Prussia went this Morning to the Prince Royal's Country Seat.

Hague, Sept. 11, N. S. Prince William of Hesse-Cassel left this Place Yesterday, in order to go and visit his Friends at Amsterdam, but is expected to return hi-

ther again on Saturday next. His Highness makes strong Interest to engage the States to take his Son into their Service in his Room.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy; These are to give Notice to all such Widows, whose Husbands died or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kingsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbet, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governours of the said Charity intending to distribute some Relief to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, and whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment; These are to give Notice to all such Widows, to repair or send to the above-mentioned Places, that they may be provided with the proper Certificates. And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they shall meet at this Office on Tuesday the 14th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, in order to receive and adjust the Claims of all such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
