Petersbourg, August 28.

BY a Courier who arrived here the 26th Instant, there is Advice, that Felt Marshal Count Munich was full at the Perecop, where his Troops are a little harassed by the Tartars, who, (the said General now finds) can come out of the Crimea without passing the Perecop, the Gniloie More being so shallow in several Places, that both Horse and Foot can ford it, which the Russians did not know before. It is said Count Munich mentions, that some Thousands of the Tartars have passed the said Sea, and joined the Nagay Tartars, with a View to intercept his little Parties and Provisions. Felt-Marshal Lacy, who had Directions to march from Afoph with the Troops under his Command, in order to join the grand Army, was arrived at Bachmuth, and was to continue his Journey by the Lines, not being able to go through the Desert, which is the shortest Way, on Account of the extreme Heats there have been this Summer in those Parts, where no Water is to be found on the Road. The 23d Instant there happened a great Storm of Thunder and Lightning at Crownstat, where the Lightning fell on the Great Man of War called Peter the First and Second, and set Fire to her Main-mast, which Fire might probably have spread among the Merchant Ships in the Haven, had not the People exerted themselves in endeavouring to put a Stop to its Progress, which they did by speedily cutting the said Main-mast quite away.

Hague, Sept. 28, N. S. The Princess Royal and the Prince of Orange arrived here in a Yacht on the 26th Instant in the Evening. Their Highnesses were met at their Landing by a Multitude of People, who followed them to their House with joyful Acclamations. Yesterday their Highnesses were visited by several Members of the Regency, as also by all other Persons of Distinction here. The Grand Pensionary continues to be very much indisposed with the Gout, which is the Reason why no Day is yet fixed for the Meeting of the States of Holland. M. Grevenbroeck, the Palatine Envoy to the Court of France, who is now here, after several Conferences which have been held between the Ministers of this Republic and him, has delivered a Memorial to them, in Answer to a Memorial of the King of Prussia, relating to the Succession of Juliers and Bergues. The Spanish Ambassador M. St. Gil, has intimated to the Regency, and all publick Ministers here, that the Disputes between the Emperor and the King his Master, were at last adjusted, and that the Instruments of the Cessions (such as desired by Spain) were arrived at Paris, and forwarded to Madrid. Don Louis d'Acunha, the Portuguese Minister, designs to set out for Paris some Day next Week, when M. de Cerda, who is coming to act in his Absence, is expected to arrive here. The said Minister has undoubtedly Thoughts of returning again to this Place, having newly hired a Country House for three Years, and made other Dispositions that seem to confirm his having such an Intention. M. Ginkel, the States Minister at the Court of Prussia, arrived here this Morning from Berlin, having had Leave of their High Mightinesses to come home for a short Time on his private Affairs. Letters from Milan of the 12th Instant give an Account, that on the 6th the Marshal de Noailles having taken Leave of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction there,

set out for Pavia. On the 7th, a Body of Imperialists led by General Wachtendonck, took Possession of that City, being received at the Gates by the Magistrates, the Nobility, and the Militia under Arms: And the same Day took Possession likewise of the Citadel.
