Keyseiling, her Czarish Maje-sty's Minister at this Court, has presented a second Memorial, upon the Subject of the conti-nual Incursions made by the Tartars into Po-land, and enforces the Necessity of his Polish Majesty's taking speedily proper Measures to hinder such Practices for the future. Count Sulkowski, who went from hence on the 10th Instant to Lissa, returned hither again this Day. Count Lynar, the Polish Minister to the Court of Petersbourg, who is now re-turned hither with his Polish Majesty's Leave, reports, that the Russians think there is the strictest Friendship sublishing between the Perfians and them, and that the News which had been fpread of a Peace being concluded between the Grand Signior and the Sophy of Persia, was entirely without Foundation. M. de Loss, his Polish Majesty's Minister to the Court of Great Britain, arrived here a sew Days ago from Hanover.

Copenhagen, Oct. 27, N. S. The 19th Inflant, being the Birth-day of the Princel's Louifa, the fame was celebrated at Friedensburg in plain Habits, according to the Ordonnance of the 16th of April last, to restrain Luxury in Apparel. This Princes, who is Daughter to their present Danish Majesties, enters now into the Eleventh Year of her Age. The King of Denmark went lately to survey the Building of his new Palace, which has already occasioned a vast Expence, and is now advanced to the third Story. The Danish Court came Yesterday to Fridericksberg, a Town in this Neighbourhood, where it is

Hague, Nov. 2, N.S. The States of the

Province of Holland will assemble on the 14th Instant; and it is hoped the Grand Pensionary may then be able to affiff in their Deliberations. M.
