*Petersbourg, October 9.*

**O**N Monday last the Russian Officer who carried Count Osterman's Answer to the Grand Vizier's Letter, returned hither; but the Contents of what that Gentleman brought have not yet been made Publick. A Body of Crim Tartars who lately plundered and burnt some Russian Villages near Bachmut and Ufum, and carried off about 1500 of the Czarina's Subjects, were met and entirely defeated by a Party of Don Cossacks, who retook the Russian Prisoners, and sent them Home. The last Accounts this Court have received from their Army, mention, that the Grand Vizier, after having advanced with his Forces beyond the Danube, was returned to Constantinople, whereby he has put an End to the present Campaign; and the Czarina's Troops being now in Winter Quarters, it is not expected there will be any more Actions heard of from them, at least till the next Spring.

*Copenhagen, Oct. 30, N. S.* As M. Johnn, the present Danish Minister at the Court of Great Britain, is to be removed soon from that Station, his Danish Majesty has been pleased to name M. Solenthal to succeed him therein, and this Gentleman has accordingly received Orders to repair to England without Loss of Time. M. de la Noue delivered Yesterday to the King of Denmark a Letter from the Prince of Conti, notifying the Death of the Princess. Count Danneskiold has received lately a fresh Mark of his Danish Majesty's Favour, having been appointed Superintendent of every thing relating to the Sea Service. Orders are likewise given, that for the future, all Applications in that Province, instead of being made, as usual, to the Admi-

ralty, shall be made to him alone. This Day being appointed as a Jubilee, to commemorate the Expulsion of the Roman Catholic Bishops, and the Establishment of those of the Protestant Religion in this Country, the King went in State to the Church of St. Nicholas to assist at the Festival, which was celebrated with Sermons, Orations, and a particular Form of Prayer.

*Berlin, Nov. 2, N. S.* Reports here are strong, that the Peace between the Persians and Turks is certainly concluded; and M. Brackel's, the Russian Minister's Advices, give room to suspect they are not without Foundation. That Minister has let fall, that his Court was ready to do the same, if the Turks would only yield up Afoph; but, according to some Letters, that Point is like to meet with great Difficulties at the Ottoman Porte, whose Thoughts are the same as the Russians with respect to the Importance of that Place. General Pretorius, the Danish Minister, has taken his Audience of Leave of the King of Prussia at Wusterhausen, and in a few Days he proposes to wait on the Prince Royal at Reinsberg; after which he will set out on his Return home.

*Hague, Nov. 9, N. S.* The States of the Province of Holland are to assemble on Wednesday next; and before they separate, will dispose of several Civil and Military Employments that are vacant within the Repartition of their Province: Many Persons are already come hither to sollicite those Employments. Lieutenant General Caris, Governour of Maestricht, is dead, by which the Government of that Place, and the Command of a Regiment are become vacant. A Ship which could not keep up with the rest of the Fleet which came lately from the East Indies, is safely arrived at Amsterdam.
