Petersbourg, October 16.

THE Russian Troops are now all in Winter Quarters; those under the Command of Felt Marshal Munich, at Kiöff, and those commanded by Felt Marshal Lacy, about Ufum. The Officer who carried a Letter from Count Osterman to the Grand Vizier, and returned hither lately with his Answer thereto, reports, that the Turks had not pass'd the Danube; that their Army did not consist of above Fifty Thousand Men; and that all sorts of Provisions were excessive dear in their Camp. The Persian Ambassadour here continues to assure, in the strongest Terms, that his Master will never consent to make Peace with the Turks, unless her Czarish Majesty be included in the Treaty; and this Court seems to depend upon those Promises, though all Accounts from Constantinople, speak of a Treaty's being on foot and near its Conclusion, between the Grand Signior and the Sophy.

Madrid, Nov. 6, N. S. On the 3d Instant died at the Escorial, Don Joseph Patino, Prime Minister to the King of Spain. His Funerals are to be performed in this City at the King's Expence, and with the greatest Solemnity. During his Illness the King conferred upon him the Title of Grandee of Spain of the first Rank.

Hanover, Oct. 31, O. S. Yesterday, being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Birth-day, was celebrated here with all Demonstrations of Joy.

This Day M. John, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, had a private Audience of Leave of her Majesty; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Harrington one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.
