**B**aron Sohlenthal is to repair with all speed to England, to succeed M. Johnn there as his Danish Majesty's Minister. Mr. Finch, his Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Court of Sweden, is daily expected to arrive here in his Way to Stockholm. The Queen of Denmark and the Margravine, have not appeared in Publick several Days, being both much indisposed.

*Berlin, Nov. 13, N. S.* A few Days ago the King of Prussia, with the Queen, and the young Princes and Princesses, removed from Wusterhausen to Cossenblat, a Country House not far from Francfort on the Oder, which his Majesty bought last Year of Count Barfous, and to which Place his Prussian Majesty has taken a great liking. From thence his Prussian Majesty was to go, as Yesterday, to see the Fair of Francfort. To morrow or next Day he returns again to Cossenblat, and after a short Stay there, the whole Court is expected here in Town; between which Places and Potzdam they will spend the best Part of the Winter as usual. They talk here of a Visit which the Duke and Dutchess of Brunfwick are to make soon to their Prussian Majesties.

*Hague, Nov. 20, N. S.* There was Yesterday a Conference held upon the Affairs relating to the Succession of Bergues and Juliers, when the Resolutions of the States upon that Subject were delivered to Mr. Trevor, his Britannick Majesty's Minister, and to M. Fenelon, the French Ambassadour. They had an Account here this Morning from Spain, that upon the Death of Don Joseph Patino, Don Sebastian de la Quadra was made Secretary of State, and the Marquess de la Torre Secretary of the Finances and Marine Affairs. The deceased M. Patino had desired to be buried in his Jesuit's Habit. The States of Holland continue their Assembly. The Pensionary being now pretty well, assists therein, which may, it is hoped, contribute to facilitate the Dispatch of several Down-tick Affairs that have lain long undetermined.

Whitehall, November 19.

This being the Anniversary of the Birthday of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, her Majesty was pleased to come from Kensington to St. James's to receive the Compliments upon that Occasion, of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, who appeared in great Numbers, and very richly dressed, and who likewise paid their Compliments to their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess, who continuing at St. James's, there was a Ball at Night. Her Majesty, with the rest of the Royal Family, went back to Kensington in the Afternoon.
