A PROCLAMATION,

CAROLINE R. C. R.

HEREAS the Parliament flands prorogued to Thursday the Twen-

ty fifth Day of this Inftant No-vember, We with the Advice of his Majefty's Privy Council, do hereby pub-lifh and declare, That the faid Parliament fhall be further prorogued, on the faid Twen-ty fifth Day of November, to Friday the One and twentieth Day of January next enfuing; and We have given Order to the Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Committion for proroguing the fame accordingly : And We do hereby further declare our Will and Plea-fure to be, That the faid Parliament fhall, on the faid One and twentieth Day of January next, be held and fit for the Difpatch of divers weighty and important Affairs : And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeffes, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the Houle of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Weftminfler, on the faid One and twentieth Day of January next.

Given at the Court at Kenfington the Twenty fourth Day of November, in the Tenth Tear of his Majefty's Reign. GOD fave the KING.

Stockbolm, Nov. 9. Count Teffin, and Meff. Ghedda, Neres, and Celfing, Counfellors of the Chancery, are making Intereft to fucceed M. Cedercreutz, who was Secretary of State, but is now made President of the Council of Revision. Count Horn, who had not been Abroad for fome Days on Account of a flight Indisposition, is now fomewhat better, and was Yesterday at Court, and in the Senate. Senator Cronhielm is fo ill of a Fever, that the Phylicians give no hopes of his Recovery. General Armfeldt, who was Commander in Chief in Finland, died there last Week. Count Lynar having obtained leave of his Danish Majesty to make a Tour to Copenhagen on his private Affairs, fet out from hence for that Place on the 29th paft.

Copenhagen, Nov. 24, N. S. An Enquiry having been made here into the Conduct of M. Jacobi (whom the King of Denmark had raifed to the Dignity of a Counfellor of Juffice and Treafurer of his Privy Purfe) he appears to have been guilty of great Middemeanours and Frauds in his Office. The King how-ever has pardoned him to far as not to take away his Life or Honour; but he is turned out of his Poft, and all his Papers and Ef-fects are feized. Lieutenant General Arnold fects are feized. Lieutenant General Arnold, the prefent Governour of Rendsberg, is appointed to fucceed Lieutenant General Romeling lately decealed, as Commander in chief of his Danish Majesty's Forces in the Kingdom of Norway. It is thought the Government of Rendsberg is not yet disposed of, but that General Scholten stands the fairest for it. M. Bernsdorff, the Danish Envoy at the Court of Dreiden, is come hither by the King's Permission upon his private Astairs, and waited Yesterday for the first Time on his Danifh Majefty.

Hague, Dec. 1, N. S. M. Slingelandt, the Grand Penfionary of Holland, died about Five of the Clock this Morning, fo fuddenly, that the Servant who conftantly attended him a-Nights, had barely Time to call his Lady to be a Witness of his expiring.

Dublin, November 20. Yesterday being the Birth-Day of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, the Great Guns were fired at the Barracks and an-fwered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrifon which were drawn out upon Oxmantown-Green : At Noon there was a fplendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Perfons of Diffinction to compliment the Lords Juffices upon this Occasion ; and at Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies.
