WHEREAS the Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty fifth Day of this Instant November, We with the Advice of his Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, That the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said Twenty fifth Day of November, to Friday the One and twentieth Day of January next ensuing; and We have given Order to the Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly: And We do hereby further declare our Will and Pleasure to be, That the said Parliament shall, on the said One and twentieth Day of January next, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on the said One and twentieth Day of January next.

Stockholm, Nov. 9. Count Tessin, and Mess. Ghedda, Neres, and Celsing, Counsellors of the Chancery, are making Interest to succeed M. Cedercreutz, who was Secretary of State, but is now made President of the Council of Revision. Count Horn, who had not been Abroad for some Days on Account of a slight Indisposition, is now somewhat better, and was Yesterday at Court, and in the Senate. Senator Cronhielm is so ill of a Fever, that the Physicians give no hopes of his Recovery. General Armsfeldt, who was Commander in Chief in Finland, died there last Week. Count Lynar having obtained leave of his Danish Majesty to make a Tour to Copenhagen on his private Affairs, set out from hence for that Place on the 29th past.

Copenhagen, Nov. 24, N. S. An Enquiry having been made here into the Conduct of M. Jacobi (whom the King of Denmark had raised to the Dignity of a Counsellor of Justice and Treasurer of his Privy Purse) he appears to have been guilty of great Misdemeanours and Frauds in his Office. The King however has pardoned him so far as not to take away his Life or Honour; but he is turned out of his Post, and all his Papers and Effects are seized. Lieutenant General Arnold, the present Governour of Rendsberg, is appointed to succeed Lieutenant General Rome-

ling lately deceased, as Commander in chief of his Danish Majesty's Forces in the Kingdom of Norway. It is thought the Government of Rendsberg is not yet disposed of, but that General Scholten stands the fairest for it. M. Bernsdorff, the Danish Envoy at the Court of Dresden, is come hither by the King's Permission upon his private Affairs, and waited Yesterday for the first Time on his Danish Majesty.

Hague, Dec. 1, N. S. M. Slingelandt, the Grand Pensionary of Holland, died about Five of the Clock this Morning, so suddenly, that the Servant who constantly attended him a-Nights, had barely Time to call his Lady to be a Witness of his expiring.

Dublin, November 20.

Yesterday being the Birth-Day of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, the Great Guns were fired at the Barracks and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison which were drawn out upon Oxmantown-Green: At Noon there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction to compliment the Lords Justices upon this Occasion; and at Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies.
