Copenhagen, November 27.

M Berensdorff, who returned hither lately from the Court of the King of Poland, and was at first received by his Danish Majesty in Publick, has since been sent for to a private Audience, at the Conclusion of which his Majesty gave him the Key of Chambellan.

Hague, Dec. 4, N. S. Upon the Death of M. Slingelandt, the States of Holland have been summoned to be here on Thursday next, in order to assemble the Day following. This Morning died M. Boetselaer, President of the Committeerde Raade, which Incident increases the present Motions of this Government, several Places being thereby become vacant. His Excellency M. Horatio Walpole is expected here on Saturday next.

Hague, Dec. 7, N. S. The States of Holland assembled this Morning. The Choice of a Grand Pensionary will not be made till their ordinary Assembly in March next. The Orders for the Detachments of Guards to lye ready on the Road by which the King of Great Britain comes, are issued; his Majesty being to set out from Hanover on the 18th Instant. This Evening the deceased Pensionary Slingelandt was buried with great Funeral Pomp. Yesterday all the Papers that were in his House, belonging to the State, were delivered to the Committeerde Raade, as were also the Seals which M. Boetselaer President of that Council had. We expect his Excellency Mr. Walpole here To-morrow, unless the rainy bad Weather we have had should retard his Arrival a Day or two longer.
