Yesterday all the Papers that were in his House, belonging to the State, were delivered to the Committeerde Raade, as were also the Seals which M. Boetselaer President of that Council had. We expect his Excellency Mr. Walpole here To-morrow, unless the rainy bad Weather we have had should retard his Arrival a Day or two longer.
