Hague, December 19, N. S.

**T**HIS Day at Ten in the Forenoon, her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange was delivered, after a long and dangerous Labour, of a Princess, who died in the Birth. Her Royal Highness is as well as can be expected in her Condition.

*Helvoetfluys, Dec. 21, N. S.* The King left Hanover about Ten of the Clock on Tuesday Night the 18th Instant, and got to Bentheim on Wednesday about Nine at Night, and on Thursday Evening about Ten arrived at Utrecht; from whence his Majesty set out this Morning, and came to this Place a little after Seven in the Evening, where he continues in perfect Health.

*Helvoetfluys, Dec. 22, N. S.* By Letters arrived this Morning from the Hague, we have had the Pleasure of hearing that her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange continued in a fair Way of doing well.

*Hague, Dec. 21, N. S.* His Excellency Mr. Walpole set out from hence this Morning to go to Helvoetfluys, as did likewise Yesterday my Lord De la War and Baron Hat-torff. In the present Situation of Domestick Affairs here, there is a Plan prepared in the College of Nobles, to be laid before the States of Holland at their next Meeting, relating to the publick Places to be filled up, viz. M. Obdam to be made President of the Commit-teerde Raede, and Keeper of the Seals; Brigadier Waffenaer, the present Colonel of the Guards and Governour of Willemstad, leaving the Military Service, to be made Bailiff

of the Hague, and one of the Directors of the East India Company; M. Vander Duyn desisting from his Pretension to that Baili-wick, to have instead thereof the Regiment of Foot Guards for his Brother the Brigadier Vander Duyn, and a Place of Heemraad of Rhineland for his Son, continuing himself in the Council of State; M. Hompesch to have the Government of Willemstad; and M. Ben-ting to be made Deputy to the States Gene-ral. It is uncertain whether the States of Holland will approve of this Plan. As for their Pensionary, very probably M. Vander Heim will be the Succesor of M. Slinge-landt, the Town of Amsterdam declaring for him; in which Case, 'tis said M. Ten Hove will be made Treasurer General in the Room of M. Vander Heim; and young M. Fagel Secretary to the Council of State, in the Room of M. Ten Hove.
