Extratt of a Letter written from Aleppo; November 19. 1672.

Wo days fince we received Letters from India, written by the English President refiding at Suratte, who acquaints us with the daily fears they have there, from Sevagee the Rebel, who having beaten the Mogulin feveral Batt els, remains almost Master of that Countrey, and takes the boldnefs to write to all the European Ministers in Suratte, that if they refule to fend him fuch and fuch immediate prefents of Money (which as he puts them would amount to vaft fums) by way of Contribution, he will return and ruine that City; That he exacts the like from the Inhabitants, who certainly would comply with his De-mands, but that the Officers of the Mogul, being Which puts them into an exthere hinder them. tream Streight, and caules others daily to convey away their richeffe; many also embarking and tranfporting them elves into other parts, to avoid the form they fear will fall upon them.

'Tis probable that the Island of Bombay, belonging to the Hnglish, will reap no smal benefit by these Broyles; to which place many Bannians flock with their Families and Estates. 'Tis reported that that Island is now made one of the richess and pleasantest places in all India. 'Tis faid, they want nothing but some industrious English hands, and that is in intended to engage what numbers may be, to come and Inhabit there. with a promise of many confiderable advantages, especially that of Trade in all Alfa, and to Affrica, as far as the Cape of Good Hope, and to the Gulfe of Person, and feveral Islands in those parts.

- smirna, Dec. 14. The Corfairs in the Arches, continue very Intent upon Prey, pillaging almost every Ciriftian Ship that falls into their hands, or pretecte of Tarks, Jews or Armenians Goods. Larely the Marquis of Flori, a Savoyard, in a Ship of 50. Guns, took all the Silk and other fine Goods out of the Great Alexander of Venice, Commanded by Capt. Simon: But not long after, meeting with a florm, he was caft away on the Ifle of Paros, where the Men being come fafe afhoar, fortified themfelves, and planted their Guns upon their Works; of which Capt: Simon having advice, he procured three Venetian men of War to revenge his quarrel, and fo failing to Paros, affaulted the Works, and took the Marquis with all his-Men and Goods, intending to proceed against them as Pirates.

Stockholm, Jan. 24. Some days fince paffed here a publick Minister from Muscowy to the Danish Court, whose business is said to be, to know of that King, what affistances he would give his Master the next Spring, for the driving the Turks out of their new Conquests in Poland.

His Majesty of *Sweden* is lately gone to the Copperberg, attended by the Chancellor, Treasurer, and some other Senators: fince his departure the Marquis de Feuquieres, Ambasilador from his most

Christian Majesty, is arrived here, but intends to remain *incognito*, until the return of the Court. Here is allo arrived a Gentleman from the Duke of Wirtenberg, to propose, as is faid, a Marriage between the eldest Son of that Duke, and the Princels Magdalene, Niece to the Queen Mother of Sweden. And we expect hourly to hear of the arrival of an Envoy from the Elector of Brandenburg, whole Commission is faid to be, to prefs this King to an observance of the last Treaty made betwirt this Crown and his Master, for the defence of the peace of the Empire.

Warfaw, Jan. 31. Hitherto little progreis hath been made in the Negotiation about the composure propoled with the Male-contents. TheBishop of Gracom returned the 29 inftant from Lowitz, where he left the Palatine of Witepsky his Collegue; and yefterday that Prelate made a Report to the Senate, touching the Conference had with the faid Malecontents, who are faid to have expressed an inclination to Peace, with a defire of security for their Persons, to be given by the King and the Republick, that fo they may come with fa ety to declare their own minds themfelves . But notwithstanding all this, there is ground to apprehend, the perional appearance of this People, and their pretended in-clination to adjust all differences, will prove fuccel-les. However, the Court yesterday dispatche away Letters and Palsports to them, nominating withal the Palatins of Sendomir and Vilna and fome others for Mediators to Treat with them, the refult whereof you may expect by the next.

Madrid, Feb. 1. Troops are still raising throughout this Kingdom, and particularly in this Town, to be sent for Catalogna. The 19 of Fanuary a Courrier was dispatcht for Cadiq, to halten away the 18 \$hips of the Armada Royal, that are to meet the Gallions expected, which Squadron is to be Commanded by Don Pedro Corbet.

Bruffels, Feb. 17. There happened yefterday morning about four of the clock, a great Fire in our Publick Store houfe for Coals, wherein were 2009 facks of Char-coal, of which the greatelt part was burnt; But by the early care that was applyed, it was happily ftopped there, without doing farther, milchief,

Breft, Feb. 11. The first instant the Count & Eftree came to an Anchor in the Road of Cameret, with part of the Royal Squadron under his Command. The next Morning he landed, after he had fent away the other Ships of the fame Squadron for Rechfort, to careen there, himself being now gone to attend the King. He stayed four days at Lisbene, and seven days more at the entry of the Bay of Cadit, whence he hath conducted bither, a considerable Fleet of Merchant Ships, both English and French, richly laden. There were then in the faid Bay, three Dutch men of War, which upon the appearance of our Squadron, drew in between the two Forts for faster.
