**T**HE States of the Province of Holland having adjourned to the 9th of next Month, the Domestick Affairs they had before them remain as they were till then. Letters from Berlin of the 18th Instant say, the King of Prussia had been indisposed of a Cold, but was perfectly recovered: That the Margravine of Brandebourg-Schwed, his Prussian Majesty's Daughter, had been brought to Bed of a Princess; and that the Baron de Bork, his Prussian Majesty's Minister to the Court of Great Britain, set out that Evening for Holland in order to pass over to England.

And for a further Encouragement for the Discovery of such Offender or Offenders, I do hereby promise to pay the Sum of Thirty Pounds upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, to such Person or Persons as shall be intitled thereto.

Whereas Informations have been given upon Oath, that the House of Mrs. Ann Langford, at Albrohatch Green, in the Parish of Barking, and County of Essex, was, on the 23d, 25th, and 27th of November last past, and on the 1st Instant, in the Night Time, attempted to be broke open by Persons unknown; and that on the 4th Instant a Letter was found in the Garden belonging to the said House, demanding Money of the said Mrs. Langford, since which she has received a threatening Message from unknown Persons: Her Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in any of the above-mentioned Facts, or either of them, is pleased to promise His Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Persons who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement, her Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds for every one of

the Criminals who shall be discovered and apprehended, as aforesaid; to be paid upon the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.
