THE Meeting of the States of Holland remains fix'd to the 9th Instant. In the mean Time their Domestick Affairs remain as they were, except only, that M. d'Obdam actually exercises the Office of President of the Committeerde Raede, in his own Right, as being the first of the Nobles of this Province. The Advices we have at present from all Hands agree, that the Differences between the Courts of Vienna and Spain are accommodated, and that the Evacuations both in Italy and Germany will forthwith be made.

On Sunday last about One o'Clock in the Afternoon, Mr. Bill, one of his Majesty's Messengers, arrived at St. James's with Advice of his Majesty's having on Monday the 20th Instant, about Eleven in the Morning, sailed from Helvoetluys for England, and after having been Thirty Hours at Sea, in very boisterous Weather and with contrary Winds, was obliged to return again to that Harbour, where his Majesty safely landed on Tuesday about Five in the Afternoon, and was, (God be praised) in perfect Health when this Messenger came away, who was dispatched by Him the next Day.

Whereas Informations have been given upon Oath, that the House of Mrs. Ann Langford, at Allrobatch Green, in the Parish of Barking, and County of Essex, was, on the 23d, 25th, and 27th of November last past, and on the 1st Instant, in the Night Time, attempted to be broke open by Persons unknown; and that on the 4th Instant a Letter was found in the Garden belonging to the said House, demanding Money of the said Mrs. Langford, since which she has received a threatening Message from unknown Persons: Her Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in any of the above-mentioned Facts, or either of them, is pleased to promise His Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Persons who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a farther Encouragement, her Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds for every one of the Criminals who shall be discovered and apprehended as aforesaid; to be paid upon the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.
