Vienna, December 15, N. S.

ADVICE was brought hither by the last Courier from France, that Orders had been actually sent to the Marshal du Bourg, concerning the immediate Evacuation of the Places of the Empire, in Exchange for the Cession of the Dutchy of Bar. General Seckendorf is set out for Hungary to visit the Winter-Quarters, and to put the Places and the Troops there into as good a Condition as the present Circumstances of this Court will allow; and the Prince of Hildburghausen is likewise gone to appease the rising Tumults on the Side of Croatia: Those People thought it was against their Privileges to furnish Winter-Quarters like the Hungarians, and in that Persuasion they put themselves into a Posture to oppose the Entrance of some Cavalry into their Districts; upon which General Suckau, who commanded that Body of Troops, had the Prudence to halt: There are likewise Grievances of an older Date; but it is generally expected that the Prince of Hildburghausen's Preference will dissipate these dangerous Beginnings.

Hague, January 4, N. S. The King having met at Sea, when advanced 18 or 20 Leagues towards England, a great Storm and contrary Wind, was obliged to return to Helvoetsluys, where his Majesty safely arrived on the 1st Instant in the Evening, as did likewise four of the Yachts and three Men of War; but the Charlotte Yacht was missing. His Serene Highness the Prince of Orange went on the 2d to Helvoetsluys to wait upon his Majesty, and returned hither this Morning with the Satisfaction of having left his Majesty in perfect Health. M. Fenelon, the French Ambassadour, has given Invitation to the Foreign Ministers and several other Persons of Distinction, to sup with his Excellency on Sunday next, being Twelfth-Day, Both he and the Imperial Secretary were in Conference Yesterday with the Deputies of the States, as was likewise this Day Mr. Trevor.

Helvoetsluys, Jan. 7, N. S. On the 3d Instant in the Evening came in here the Sheernels Man of War; and the 5th in the Morning came Advice, that the Charlotte Yacht was got into Terveer in Zealand.
