Copenhagen, December 18, N. S.

TWO Men of War lately built having been out upon Tryal as far as Bornholm, returned hither on Sunday Morning, and lie now in the Road before this Place. The Report of their Sailing and Working was laid before the King of Denmark Yesterday, but it is not said yet which of them has the Preference. The Young Prince of Wirtemberg-Oels is lately arrived here, with a View, as it is supposed, of entering into the Service, both his Father and Uncle having had Danish Regiments formerly. He served in the late War as Adjutant to the Duke of Wirtemberg upon the Rhine, and had likewise the Command of a Regiment of Circle-Troops, which ended at the Pacification. Being then preferred to embrace the Roman Catholick Religion, in order to make his Fortune among the Imperialists, he chose to leave them, and to turn his Pursuit to this Court, where he will undoubtedly meet with the better Reception upon Account of his conscientious Behaviour. We hear M. Gedda, the Swedish Minister at Paris, is recalled from thence to be employed at his own Court in the Post of Secretary of State for foreign Affairs. The Margravine is very weak still, and keeps her Chamber, both upon that Account and by Reason of the Cold Weather; but she has no Fever, and is not thought to be in Danger, tho' every Fit of Illness may justly give Apprehensions at her Age of Seventy.

Copenhagen, Dec. 22, N. S. The Prince of Wirtemberg-Oels begins already to feel the Propension of this Court to encourage and support him. He is lodged in one of the King's Houses, has a standing Invitation to dine every Day at his Majesty's Table, and is declared Major General of the Cavalry. The younger Margrave of Culmbach, Brother to

the Queen of Denmark, and to the Stadholder of Sleswick, is also advanced to the same Rank among the Infantry.

Berlin, Dec. 22, N. S. On Wednesday last M. Borck, his Prussian Majesty's Minister to the Court of Great Britain, set out from this Place in order to proceed to England. This Gentleman was, two Days before his Departure, introduced into the Council, and took his Place there as Privy Counsellor.

St. James's, January 3.

On Christmas-Day the Queen, their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Amelia and Caroline, with several of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, received the Holy Sacrament in her Majesty's own Apartment; the Communion Office being performed by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of London, Dean of the Chapel Royal.
