**W**E have now certain Advice, that Count Lynard, the Saxon Minister, is not to return again to this Court. Orders were sent two Days ago to M. Keyserling, the Czarina's Minister at Dreden, to return hither immediately, her Czarish Majesty being desirous to have from him by Word of Mouth, an Account of several Things that passed during the Time of his being employed at the Court of Poland. The 7th being the Birth-day of the Princess of Mecklenbourg, who then entered into the Eighteenth Year of her Age, and the 9th being her Name-day, the same were observed here with the greatest Demonstrations of Joy. All the foreign Ministers and Persons of Distinction went in the Morning to compliment her Czarian Majesty and the Princess on that Occasion, and at Night there was a Ball and Supper at Court.

*Berlin, Jan. 8, N. S.* The King and Queen of Prussia are removed from hence to Potzdam, where their Prussian Majesties will continue, as usual, till the general Review. Last Sunday three Expresses were dispatched by this Court, the one to Vienna, another to Paris, and the third to the Hague.

*Dresden, Jan. 9, N. S.* By Letters from Caminiek of the 15th of last Month, we have Advice of the Russian Minister's being arrived there from Turkey. It is said he had been hindred a good deal in the Pursuit of his Journey by the Illness of several of his Domesticks, but that he hoped to set out soon from thence, in order to join the Pa-

latin of Kiovia, who was on the Frontiers to have an Eye that the Polish Troops placed there to observe the Motions of the Tartars committed no Disorders on the Turkish Territories. M. de Loos, his Polish Majesty's Minister to the Court of Great Britain, who had the King's Permission to come hither from Hanover to pay his Duty to his Majesty, having received his Orders and Instructions, will forthwith be setting out for England, whither he intends to go by the Way of Calais. The Russian Minister, Baron Keyserling, received Yesterday an Express from his Court, with Leave to return to Petersbourg; on which Account he had afterwards a private Audience of his Polish Majesty. He proposes setting out from hence in four or five Days, and to be absent but a short Time. Late last Night Thomas Robinson, Esq; his Britannick Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Vienna, arrived here; where he intends to stay a few Days, and then proceed on his Journey to England.
