Liege, Feb: 17. The French have made the mfelves Masters, not only of the Towns Fosse and Chaftelet, but also of all the other places betwirt the Sambre and the Male, except Thuin : And there is a report, that this very place is also fallen into the French hands, upon an order they had from the Prince of Liege.

Bruffels, Feb. 24. His Excellency intends to go on Monday next to Louvain, from thence to Malines, and lo to Antwerp, and thence to continue his progrefs into Flanders, to visit feveral places there, and is not expected to return hither thele 76 or 17 days. Several new Troops are railing by his Excellencies Command, both towards the recruiting the old Regiments, and establishing new ones, and amongst others, 600 Dragoons, are defigned to be fent speedily into Burgundy. It is faid, his most Christian Majesty intends to make a Bridge over the Mofelle at Thionville. We were here much furprifed at the unanimous Vote of the Parliament, for His Majeflies present supply as being very much be-fides our expectations. The Prince of Oranges Army lies still about Alphen, in no good condition; but they expect shorely considerable Recruits. The States General 'tis faid, are about to raile the fourth part of every Mans Capital, befides all the other Taxes, in order to the putting out a firong Fleet, which they have refolved on in general fiall be done, and are to meet next week, to agree upon the particulars.

Bruffels, Fcb. 24. The Count de Marcin is again returned hither, which has put an end to the dif-course of his diffatisfaction. The Baron de Goes' continues here, and is observed to be frequently in Conference with his Excellency. We have news that the French have attacked Thuin in the Counttry of Liege, a place of Importance, and good

Strength, but with what fuccels, we yet hear not. The Marquis de Gentis, who had been called to Paris some time fince , to give account as was said, of some passages in the Service he was in , under the Duke de Luxemburg in Utrecht, is now here on his return to the fame Station. Our Letters from Italy speak, as if the Peace between gavoy and Genota were become now more doubtful.
