*Vienna, February 6, N. S.*

**A** Courier arrived on the 1st Instant from Prince Pio at Venice, with Advice, that he the Emperor's Ambassadour having had at last an Account of the Imperial Troops having actually taken Possession of Tuscany, had thought proper to deliver on the 17th past, N. S. the Emperor's Passport to Count Fuenclara, the Spanish Ambassadour to this Court, who is now expected here on the 14th or 15th Instant. Yesterday Morning at Ten of the Clock the Dutchess of Lorrain was brought to Bed of a Princess, who was baptized the same Evening at Six of the Clock in the Duke of Lorrain's second Antichamber. The Pope's Nuncio performed the Ceremony. The Emperor stood Godfather, the Godmothers were the two Empresses, and the youngest Arch-dutchess in the Name of the Dutchess Dowager of Lorrain.

*Dresden, Feb. 13, N. S.* Count Kevenhuller, the Imperial Minister late at the Court of Denmark, passed through this Place on Friday last on his Way for Vienna. By Letters from the Ukraine we are informed, that Count Munich, before his Departure from Kioff, gave Assurances to the Great General of Poland, that the Czarina would observe the Neutrality with regard to Poland during the War with the Turks. We have News from Vienna, that the Turks are now disposed to treat of Peace, and that they have named Deputies for that Purpose.

*Hague, Feb. 19, N. S.* We hear that Count Uhlfeldt left Vienna the 12th Instant to return hither by the Way of Brussels. The States of Holland continue their Assembly; but there is no Appearance that any Thing will be done as to the Disposal of the vacant Places, till their ordinary Assembly of next Month. We have an Account here from Constantinople, that the Turks have consented to a Congress upon their Frontiers, and named already their Plenipotentiaries.

Forty Three Pounds in Gold and Silver, which was tyed up in a Shot Bag and then in his Coat Pocket, and about Twenty Shillings more in Silver out of his Breeches Pocket, and a Tortoise shell Knife, and then made off, leaving the said George Ballard almost senseless.
