Petersbourg, January 22.

THIS Court continues to make very great Preparations, in order to have a numerous Army in the Field early in the Spring: A Battalion of 700 Men of each of the three Regiments of Foot Guards are ordered to march; as they are very good Troops, those 2100 Men will make a fine Appearance in the Field. About 4000 Seamen, with a Rear Admiral, nine Captains, a great Number of Lieutenants and Masters, have been sent from hence, with Anchors, Gables, and all Sorts of Stores for Shipping, to Tabaroff on the River Don, and to Branska on the Nieper; among the Officers there are five English Captains, and a great many English Lieutenants; they are to command the Boats that are built at Tabaroff and Branska. Last Wednesday being the Anniversary of her Czarrish Majesty's Accession to the Throne, all the Foreign Ministers and Russian Nobility were invited to dine at Court; at Night there was a fine Illumination, and a Ball, as usual, at the Palace.

St. James's, February 17.

This Day M. Buffy, sent from the King of France, had a private Audience of his Majesty; to which he was introduc'd by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.
