*Whitehall, March 1.*

**T**HIS being the Anniverfary of Her Majesty's Birth-day, their Majesties received at Noon the Compliments of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes. At Night there was a Ball. The Appearance was at both Times very numerous and extremely splendid. On this Occasion the Guns in the Park. and at the Tower were fired; and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.
