

Whitehall, February 18, 1736-7

Whereas three anonymous Letters have been lately sent to the House of Mrs. Mary Wighrwick, Widow, in Hatton Garden, threatening to burn her Houses in Town and Country, and to shoot her in her Coach, unless a Sum of Money was laid upon the Corner of the Step of her Door: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in so heinous a Crime, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as an Encouragement for the Discovery of such Offender or Offenders, I do hereby promise to pay the Sum of Fifty Guineas, upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, to such Person or Persons as shall be entitled thereto.
