Berlin, March 12, N. S.

General Sonsfelt's Regiment of Dragoons which lies in Pomerania, has received Orders to remove from thence on the 26th Instant to Halberstadt; and 'tis reported that several other Regiments, as Schwerin's, Vrek's, Prince William's, and Gustavus Anhalt's, are ordered to hold themselves in Readiness to march. These Motions it is thought proceed from the Apprehensions this Court have of that of Manheim's intending to oblige the Inhabitants of Bergue and Juliers to swear Eventual Homage to the Prince of Sultzbach.

Hague, March 19, N. S. There are several Letters in Town, which mention the Death of the Duke of Wirtemberg to have happened suddenly on the 12th Instant, tho' as yet that Prince's Minister here has had no direct Notice of it. We have a Report here of a Dispute that has just risen between Prince William of Hesse Cassel as Count of Hanau, and the Court of Mentz; on Account of some Bailage, which was till the Death of the late Count of Hanau, enjoyed in common by him and the Electors of Mentz, but has since been adjudged by the Aulick Council wholly to belong to the latter; upon which his Highness, it is said, has sent some Troops to maintain his Possession. As to the Affair of Bergue and Juliers, the Court of Manheim loudly disavow the Intention imputed to them by that of Berlin, of obliging the Inhabitants of those Countries to swear Eventual Homage to the Prince of Sultzbach.
