Westminster, March 21.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for continuing an Act passed in the fifth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the First, Intituled, An Act for laying a Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or one sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, upon every Pint of Ale or Beer that shall be vended or sold within the Town of Dunbar, for improving and preserving the Harbour, and repairing the Town House, and building a School and other Publick Buildings there, and for supplying the said Town with fresh Water.

And to three private Bills.

Petersbourg, Feb. 26. As yet this Court has not appointed any Plenipotentiaries to treat with those said to have been named by the Porte, of an Accommodation; and it is probable, her Czarish Majesty will wait, before she take that Step, till the Grand Visier informs her directly, or desires his Britannick Majesty's or the Emperour's Ambassadour to declare to this Court in the Name of the Porte, that they have actually named Plenipotentiaries to treat with those the Czarina shall think proper to appoint. Besides, it is believed this Ministry think the Season of the Year too far advanced to expect a Peace with the Turks without making another Campaign. On the 23d Instant her Czarish Majesty was pleased to make Rear Admiral Bredal a Vice Admiral: He arrived lately here from Afoph, and is to return very soon again to that Place.

Madrid, March 18. On Tuesday the 12th Instant Benjamin Keene, Esq; his Britannick Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary, gave an Entertainment at Fuencaral, a Village between this Town and the Pardo, in Celebration of her Britannick Majesty's Birthday. The Infante Don Phelipe is appointed by his Catholick Majesty Grand Admiral of

Spain, and of all its Maritime Forces; and the Duke de Montemar is named Minister of War, which Employment has been vacant since the Death of the late M. Patinho.

Vienna, March 18. We are assured that Count Fuenclara, the Sicilian Minister here, has demanded the second Archduchess for Don Carlos, and that he has made this Demand in separate and formal Visits last Week to all the Imperial Ministers. Count Sinzendorff has himself told it plainly to Count Tarouca: And Count Fuenclara is said to have accompanied that Demand with very advantageous Offers. Count Plettenberg, who was upon the Point of setting out from hence for his Embassy at Rome, died last Night after an Illness of Eight Days.

Hague, March 29, N. S. Baron Solenthal, the new Minister from the King of Denmark to his Britannick Majesty, is arrived here in his Way to England, whither he proposes to pursue his Journey as soon as he receives the News of the Yacht's Arrival, and the Weather shall come favourable.
