Copenhagen, March 26.

THE Blue Heron, a Frigate appointed to sail and cruize upon the Coasts of Iceland and Greenland, lies ready in the Road, and waits only for a favourable Wind to put to Sea. On the 24th the King of Denmark returned to Fridericksbourg; during his Majesty's Stay here he went to the Holm, to see with what Diligence the Workmen went forward with the Men of War now in Hand. Yesterday being Lady-day, (all Church Days being now kept here with greater Strictness than ever) there was no Council nor Court at Fridericksbourg. The Margravine, who has kept her Apartment the whole Winter, continues still under the same Indisposition and Confinement, and seems to be in a very declining Way. The Queen of Denmark, whether from Uneasiness upon her Mother's Account, or from the Weakness of her own Constitution, has likewise had frequent Illnesses of late, and shews as yet no great Signs of a perfect Recovery: But the King is perfectly well, and since his long Fit of Sickness has appeared to enjoy better Health and more Spirits than he used to do before. The Margravine's uncertain Condition will probably hinder the Court from taking any long Journey this

Summer. The Talk of it at least is dropped, and they say now that their Danish Majesties will send for Waters from Germany, and drink them here.

Dresden, March 27, Colonel Bonekaw, who was lately Minister from this Court, is sent to Hesse Cassel, to regulate with that Court, some Affairs relating to the County of Hanau.
