Petersbourg, March 8.

THE Czarina was last Night pleased to name Artemy Petrovitz Volinsky, Baron Shaffirof, and M. Neptuef, to be her Czarish Majesty's Ministers Plenipotentiaries, for treating of a Peace with the Ministers Plenipotentiaries appointed for that Purpose by the Ottoman Porte.

St. James's, March 31.

This Day the Sieur Denay, Resident from the Elector Palatine, had his first private Audience of his Majesty, to deliver his Letter of Credence in that Character; as also a Letter of Notification of the Death of the Bishop of Augsburg, the Elector's Brother: He was introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Harrington, one of his Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Knight, Master of the Ceremonies.

He had afterwards a private Audience of the Queen; to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Grantham, her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain, and conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, April 1.

This Day the Sieur Denay had a private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

And afterwards of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales; to both which he was introduced by the Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, April 4.

This Day the Sieur Denay, Resident from the Elector Palatine, had a private Audience

of his Royal Highness the Duke, and of their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Amelia, Caroline, Mary, and Louisa altogether; to which he was introduced by the Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, March 31, 1737.

Whereas Information has been given on Oath, That on Tuesday the 15th Day of this Instant March, between the Hours of Seven and Eight of the Clock in the Evening, Jonathan Linkswait, of the Borough of Leicester, in the County of Leicester, Brazier, being on Horseback in his Way from Melton Mowbray to the said Borough, was assaulted in a Place called Thrumaston Lane, in the Parish of Belgrade, in the said County, by three Persons on Horseback, one of whom seized him, and carrying him out of the Road into a Close adjoining to the said Highway, robbed him of the Sum of Twenty four Shillings, or thereabouts, his Horse Whip, and one Linen Handkerchief, and afterwards bound him Hand and Foot; and while the said Jonathan Linkswait lay bound, the said three Highwaymen robbed and bound several other Persons near that Place, and took from them in Goods and Money to the Value of Fourteen Pounds: For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robberies, his Majesty is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Description of the Persons above-mentioned.

One of them appeared to be about Five Foot Eleven Inches high, a jolly Man, of a ruddy Complexion, wore his own Hair, had on a light Drab Coat, double-breasted, with white Metal Buttons; another about Five Foot Eight Inches high, pitted with the Small Pox, and wore a brown Wig, and a brown Coat and red Waistcoat; and the third, a tall Man in a shabby Dress, with long black Hair and a yellowish or fallow Complexion. The Horses on which they rode, were a Sorrel, a dark Chestnut, and a Bay Horse, with a Star and a Snip on his Nose, and a short Swiss Tail, and each of them a black Liff down their Backs.

Whereas about Six Months ago, a Paper was affixed to the House of Mr. Ridge, Keeper of the Forrest in the Isle of Wight, threatening, That if he should take away any Gun, or hurt any Man for killing Deer out of their own Grounds or Corn, his Horse would be shot under him, and his Habitation laid low about his Ears, and to remember the Walton Blacks, for there would rise Forty Men in Arms against him in a little time; And whereas several Deer have since been killed and destroyed in the said Forrest, and on Sunday the 6th of February last, about Twelve o' Clock at Nights, a Gun loaded with Sluggs was discharged in as one of the Chamber Windows of the Dwelling House of the said Mr. Ridge, in which Chamber he was at that Time a Bed, with an Intent, as there is Reason to believe, to kill him, for that the Sluggs went through the Bed Curtains, and lodged in the Chimney-piece of the said Chamber: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in so heinous a Crime, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof. And as a further Encouragement, His Majesty is also pleased to promise a Reward of Fifty Pounds to any one of them, or to any other Person or Persons, who shall make such Discovery as aforesaid, to be paid upon the Conviction of the Offender or Offenders.
