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Plymouth, Feb. 24. Small French Vessel is come into this Port, her crew fays the belongs to a French Man of War called the Laurel ; that fhe had been taken by a Dutch Caper, and was newly retaken by a French Fregat,

but there are no Hollanders on board, nor any the least sign of her having been made a Prize.

Newcastle, Feb. 25. Here is come in a Fleet of Light Colliers, under the Convoy of some of His Majesties Ships; feveral Capers, they fay, made op towards them, and viewed them in their passage, but none durft venture in amongst them. A Swede la den with Wines from Bourdeaux, bound for this Porty was taken by a Caper between this and Flambourg Head, and carried away, as we fup-pose for Holland.

Deal, Feb. 27. The Ship Dalphin of Dublin, burthen 43 Tuns, taken the 24 inftant by a Durch Gaper, and fent towards Holland with 6 Dutch Men and two English Men and a Boy, being chasted by an English Vessel about Dover, was forced to make to the Downs, and there came to an An chor; the Dutch Men fubmitting themfelves to the English as their prisoners.

Warfam, Fcb. 7. The Deputies at Lowitz tell us ; they are willing to concur with the Republick, for the common fecurity of the Countrey again the Enemy, on these Conditions ; 1. Immediately Monfieur de Hurenne advanced towards Soeft, with fitention the drive the Energies wit of those quarters, far-ther upineo the Countres, but finding in his way a Caffle upon the Riv r Lings called Berkenham, in which were faid to be add of the Brindenburgers, for the fecuring a certain Bridg, which was thought, to be a Pais of some importance; the Marchal de Turenne Commanded out a party of 100 Men; of the Regiment du Roy under the Marquis de Bourlemont, Son to the Comte de Bourlemont, Governor of Stendy, who at the first Affault, made himfelf Malter of the place, without any confiderable lofs. The Enemy reflecting on the importance of the Pals, attempted the same night to recover it, but were beaten off with lofs. The next Morning they returned with 600 Horle, and 600 Foot, refolving to Storm the Place, which it feems is of no great defence in it felf, but were received by the Marquis with fo much courage, that above a hundred were killed upon the place, and the reft forced to quit the Defign, though seconded with a much greater Force, which was then marching up to their affistance; upon which dilgrace, the Elector finding the passage thus opened to the French, into all that upper part of the Mark, thought fit to draw off his whole Army towards Lipstadt and Bileveldt, rather then to hazard an Engagement. The General Sporke we hear is lately arrived in the Army from Vienna, with new orders from the Emperor, but of what purport we yet know not. Our Elector continues still here with the Bishop of Strasburg.

Paris, March 2. From Dole in Burgundy we hear; that that place had refused entrance to the Troops fent thither by the Sieur de Quennones, prelent Governor of the Franche Comie ; and that the Sieur de St. Maurice his Father in law. having put hiffifelf in the head of the Governors Guards, and fome other Horfe, making in all about 120 Maistres, and taken the Field with them, had been met by the Marquis
