**A** Courier arrived here Yesterday from the Turkish Camp, with Letters of the 22d inst, by which it is said there is Advice, that a Divan having been called, it was therein resolved that the Porte should send Plenipotentiaries to the Frontiers of Poland, who were accordingly appointed to set out on the 12th Instant.

*Berlin, April 16, N. S.* The Motions of some of his Prussian Majesty's Troops, on account of the Project supposed to have been formed by the Palatine Court with Respect to the Eventual Homage of the Inhabitants of Bergue and Juliers, though not countermanded, seem to be suspended, except that of Sonfelt's Dragoons, which is expected soon in the Neighbourhood of this Town, and after a few Days Halt is to proceed on their March towards Halberstadt.

*Dresden, April 17, N. S.* Major General Count Truchles, who is coming from Berlin in Quality of his Prussian Majesty's Envoy to this Court, and who it is said, is charged with his Prussian Majesty's Letter of Recognition to King Augustus, is expected to arrive here this Day. The Time for which a Cartel had been made between this Court and that of Berlin for the mutual delivering up of Deserters, being expired, Publication thereof has been made in the Saxon Army. Count Watford, who some Years since re-

sided in England as Minister of this Court, is now gone by Order, to that of Paris, to sell there the Effects of the late Count Hoim, which it is said will amount to a very considerable Sum.

Whitehall, March 31, 1737.

Whereas Information has been given on Oath, That on Tuesday the 15th Day of this Instant March, between the Hours of Seven and Eight of the Clock in the Evening, Jonathan Lintswait, of the Borough of Leicester, in the County of Leicester, Brazier, being on Horseback, in his Way from Melton Mowbray to the said Borough, was assaulted in a Place called Thrumaston Lane, in the Parish of Belgrade, in the said County, by three Persons on Horseback, one of whom seized him, and carrying him out of the Road into a Close adjoining to the said Highway, robbed him of the Sum of Twenty four Shillings, or thereabouts, his Horse Whip, and one Linen Handkerchief, and afterwards bound him Hand and Foot; and while the said Jonathan Lintswait lay bound, the said three Highwaymen robbed and bound several other Persons near that Place, and took from them in Goods and Money to the Value of Fourteen Pounds; For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robberies, his Majesty is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Description of the Persons above-mentioned.
