**T**HE States of the Province of Holland continue their Session, and their Deputies having had some Conferences with Commissioners from the several Colleges of Admiralty, it is expected they will soon come to a Resolution upon the Complaint made to them by the Town of Rotterdam, relating to the Duties on Goods collected there. The Convoy that is usually sent out to meet the East India Ships, is sailed from the Texel, those Ships being expected home in a few Days. Yesterday came Advice of the Death of the Duke of Courland. The Marquess de Fenelon is expected here To-morrow on his Return from the Court of France.
