Stockholm, June 3, O. S.

THE Queen of Sweden, who has had the Fever which has been almost general here, in a very violent Manner, is now much better, and out of all Danger.

Dresden, June 16, N. S. Count Sulkowski set out the 14th Instant from Toplitz for Vienna, from whence he will continue his Journey to Hungary, to take on him the Command of the Saxon Troops. The King and Queen are still at Toplitz, and will remain there about ten Days: The rest of the Royal Family are returned hither. By the last Letters from Vienna we had Advice, that the Saxon Horse were arrived there on their March for Hungary. This Court has recalled M. Zieck, their Minister at Vienna, and it is said that M. Bunaw, who was formerly in England, will succeed him.

Hague, June 25, N. S. The States of Holland separated on Saturday last, and will meet again for their ordinary Assembly of next Month, when they are to dispose of the Regiment of Foot Guards, and other Vacancies Civil and Military. M. Hop, M. Afendelft, and the Fiscal of the Admiralty of Zealand, are appointed to go to Antwerp as Commissaries on the Part of this State, for settling the Tariff with the Austrian Netherlands.

His Majesty has been pleased to issue his Conge d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Bangor, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Death of Dr. Charles Cecil late Bishop thereof, and recommending Thomas Herring, Doctor in Divinity, to be by them chosen Bishop thereof.

Whereas an anonymous Letter was lately received by the Right Honourable the Lord Cornbury, directed to him at the Earl of Clarndine's House in St. James's Square, London, (which Letter is supposed to have been written by Persons concerned in stealing Deer in his Majesty's Forest of Whichwood, in the County of Oxford) threatening to destroy the Houses and Stables of the said Lord Cornbury, and also to take away his Life, if he should not comply with what is therein desired: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the writing or sending the abovementioned Letter, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplish or Accomplishers, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof; and also a Reward of Fifty Pounds to such Person or Persons making such Discovery as aforesaid, payable upon the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.
