THE last Advices this Court has received from Felt Marshal Count Munich are of the 4th Instant from the Banks of the River Inglier, which is about 70 Versts from the River Bog. His Excellency informs her Czarish Majesty, that in passing through that Country he had found every Day little Rivers that discharge themselves into the Nieper, that there was great Plenty of Grass for his Cavalry; that Beef was fold in his Camp at a Copick and a Half (which is not one Penny here) a Pound; that he was continuing his March for Oczackow, where he hoped foon to arrive, not having heard that the Turks were making any Preparations to oppose his Design. A Courier is also arrived from Felt Marshal Lacy, but the Contents of

the Dispatches are not yet made publick.

Hague, July 23, N. S. The States of
Holland separated on Saturday last. Before
they broke up, they nominated M. de Dieu, formerly Minister of the States General at Moscow, to be one of the Commissioners for treating at Antwerp about fettling Commerce with the Austrian Netherlands. M. Assendelf, Refident at Brussels, is to be the second, and M. Visvliet of Zealand the third. Their Appointments are not yet fettled, nor the Time of their Departure.

On Wednesday last in the Forenoon his Majesty came from Richmond to Hide-Park, and after having reviewed the three Regiments of Foot-Guards, his Majesty returned to Richmond. On Thursday last in the Evening their Majesties and the Royal Family removed from Richmond to Hampton-Court, to pass the Remainder of the Summer there.
